### Guidelines for determining eligibility for admission with: **Social Studies**

#### Admission requirements

1. An acceptable undergraduate degree recognized by the University of Victoria.
2. 3.0 units of approved English (literature and composition).
3. Demonstrated competency in written English.
4. A sessional grade-point average (GPA) of at least 3.00/9-point scale (UVic C+) on the most recent session (if that session is less than 12 units, a GPA of at least 3.00 on the most recent 12 units) and on the most recent 30 units attempted to December 31.
5. Academic preparation in two approved subjects (referred to as teaching concentrations) or a single subject (referred to as a teaching major). A minimum GPA of at least 4.00/9-point scale (UVic B-) is required on the upper-level courses required for the teaching concentrations or major.
6. An interview may also be required.

#### Notes

- A 3-unit UVic course (same as 6 credits) meets for at least 3 hours per week for 26 weeks (2 terms or one academic year); a 1.5-unit course (same as 3 credits) meets for at least 3 hours per week for 13 weeks (1 term).
- You may be eligible to apply with a 'teaching major' even though you did not complete a major in that subject in your first degree.
- At UVic 'upper-level' refers to 300 and/or 400-level courses.
- Although one teaching major is required for admission to this program, we encourage you to prepare a second teaching area since school districts prefer to hire teachers who have more than one subject specialty.

The BC Ministry of Education defines social studies as "a multidisciplinary subject that draws from the social sciences and humanities to study human interaction and natural and social environments." In BC secondary schools, social studies is: Social Studies 8 – 11, Civic Studies 11, BC First Nations Studies 12, Comparative Civilizations 12, Geography 12, History 12, Law 12 and Social Justice 12. The curriculum documents may be viewed on the BC Ministry of Education web site.

We will accept courses from the following disciplines if they are related to the BC social studies curriculum: economics, political science, sociology, history and geography. For example, UVic's ECON 321 The Economic History of Canada is accepted **but not** ECON 310B Competition Policy.

We will also accept social studies related courses from Canadian studies, Asian & Pacific studies, women's studies, native studies, urban studies and environmental studies if they are related to economics, political science, sociology, history or geography. A limited number of courses from anthropology, criminology, classical studies (Greek & Roman), international relations, law or religious studies will be accepted on a case-by-case basis.

**Please complete sections A and B.** You need 15 units of upper-level social studies related courses to qualify with a social studies teaching major; at least 12 units of social studies related courses (with a minimum 9 upper-level units) to qualify with a social studies teaching concentration.

<sup>1</sup> A 1.5 unit Canadian history course will satisfy both the Canadian social studies and history requirements; a 1.5 unit Canadian regional geography course will satisfy both the Canadian social studies and geography requirements. <sup>2</sup> The focus of the course must be on Canada. Courses using Canadian examples as a means to explore a discipline <b>will not be accepted</b> . Cultural studies courses will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.

### Written English Competency

- ☐ Completion of an English composition course (for example, UVic's ENGL 115, 135 or 215) with a grade of B- or better.
- OR
- ☐ Completion of 3.0 units of English literature (for example, UVic's ENGL 125 and 145 OR ENGL 146 and 147) with an average grade of B- or better.
- Consult an adviser if you have ever completed a composition course with less than a B- grade even if you have since completed two literature courses with a B- average.*

If your English grades are not high enough to satisfy this requirement, contact the Teacher Education Advising Office and ask about UVic's English Equivalency Test (EET). It may be an option for you. A grade of B- or better on that test demonstrates competency in written English.

### Required grade averages

To be considered for admission, you'll need:

- a C+<sup>1</sup> average on the last 30 units attempted to December 31<sup>2</sup>, and
- a C+ average on the most recent session<sup>3</sup> attempted, and
- a B-<sup>4</sup> average on the upper-level courses required for your teaching area(s). When fewer than 9 units of upper-level courses are required for a teaching area, 200-level courses will be used in the calculation.

<sup>1</sup>A C+ is equivalent to 3.00 on UVic's 9-point scale (65 – 69%).

<sup>2</sup>The 30-unit GPA to December is used rank eligible applicants.

<sup>3</sup>If the most recent session is less than 12 units, the average will be calculated on the most recent 12 units.

<sup>4</sup>A B- is equivalent to 4.00 on UVic's 9-point scale (70 – 72%).
