### Guidelines for determining eligibility for admission with Spanish

#### Admission requirements

1. An acceptable undergraduate degree recognized by the University of Victoria.
2. 3.0 units of approved English (literature and composition).
3. Demonstrated competency in written English.
4. A sessional grade-point average (GPA) of at least 3.00/9-point scale (UVic C+) on the most recent session (if that session is less than 12 units, a GPA of at least 3.00 on the most recent 12 units) and on the most recent 30 units attempted to December 31.
5. Academic preparation in two approved subjects (referred to as teaching concentrations) or a single subject (referred to as a teaching major). A minimum GPA of at least 4.00/9-point scale (UVic B-) is required on the upper-level courses required for the teaching concentrations or major.
6. An interview may also be required. In lieu of an interview, applicants may be asked to submit a letter of intent, résumé and reference letters.

#### Notes

- A 1.5-unit course (same as 3 credits) meets for at least 3 hours per week for 13 weeks (1 term); a 3-unit UVic course (same as 6 credits) meets for at least 3 hours per week for 26 weeks (2 terms or one academic year).
- You may be eligible to apply with a 'teaching major' even though you did not complete a major in that subject in your first degree.
- At UVic 'upper-level' refers to 300 and/or 400-level courses.
- Although one teaching major is required for admission to this program, we encourage you to prepare a second teaching area since school districts prefer to hire teachers who have more than one subject specialty.

All prospective candidates, including native speakers of Spanish require **at least 12.0 units of university-level Spanish courses** to qualify for admission.

Prospective Spanish candidates who have completed UVic's major or minor in Spanish or an equivalent program elsewhere are eligible for admission. The program must include at least 9 units of upper-level language and/or literature courses (not in translation) with a B- average. **Note:** We'll accept a 1.5 unit cultural studies course provided that the course was taught in Spanish and not in English.

The requirements for **UVic's Hispanic Studies programs** are outlined in the UVic calendar (<http://web.uvic.ca/calendar>). In addition to the required lower-level courses, you'll likely take SPAN 350A, 350B; at least two of SPAN 370, 375, 380, 385; and at least two 400-level Spanish electives. For the electives, choose language and literature courses. We recommend that you choose from SPAN 450A, 490A, 490B and 490C.

**Alert!** All prospective candidates, both native and non-native speakers, must successfully pass a **language competency examination** (oral and written) normally held in April.

Required grade averages	
To be considered for admission, you'll need: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a C+<sup>1</sup> average on the last 30 units attempted to December 31<sup>2</sup>, and</li> <li>a C+ average on the most recent session<sup>3</sup> attempted, and</li> <li>a B-<sup>4</sup> average on the upper-level courses required for your teaching area(s).
