The more things change the more they stay the same. At least that's how it seems to me, particularly upon returning to Victoria circa eight years ago after leaving this "shorts and flowers in February" utopia some 20 years ago. I find it both familiar and alien to visit some of the places that I habituated in my youth (age zygote to 18), some of which I'd like to share with you now.

The first is a place to play, and what better location for UVic and surrounding families than Gyro Park. The octopus, salmon, and serpent have been there so long that my mother recalls climbing the concrete beasts as a child herself, a fact that probably requires further investigation. As children we would, as I often do with my kids, stop in at *For Good Measure* to stock up on dried fruit, penny candies and almonds before we scampered down to the beach.

Heading out from Gyro, up Cadboro Bay Rd. then winding through the Uplands you'll find yourself at Uplands Park; a haven for dog walkers then, and still today, so watch your step. Continue southwest along the coast line and you'll find the comfort of Willows Beach, and the Oak Bay Tea Room from which the Kiwanis Club has served fries, hot dogs and the like for years on end.

Continue along the coast and skip forward to Dallas Road, which used to be a lot of fun in storm season, dampened though in 'modern' times by a reinforced and extended beachfront. Traversing along Dallas Rd. you'll eventually, without meaning to, bump in to Beacon Hill Park, clearly one of the crown jewels of the Victoria proper region. This park used to (cont'd)

A New Report Explores the Evolution of Fatherhood

The "Give Love, Get Love" report published by The Involved Father and Gender Equity Project details the experiences of fifty-three fathers in communities across Ontario and explores changes in fatherhood. The findings of the study include:

- "Involved fatherhood has benefits for children, mothers and fathers. Fathers indicated that they feel more emotionally connected to their children and prioritize their children and family over other aspects of their lives. Fathers indicate that their involvement results in greater co-parenting and greater emotional attachment between partners."
- "Many fathers are actively finding ways to counter the traditional gender stereotypes. In their roles as fathers they are providing opportunities to their children and making choices for their children that allow the children to exist outside of the stereotypes that are often associated with boys and girls."
- "Fathers in this study indicate that their involvement with their children promotes gender equality. Fathers are role modeling gender equality with their children and understand the importance of having conversations about equality with their children. Fathers in this study also suggest that a change is occurring in relationships, where equality is more present within their relationships than ever before."

Some cool stats about Canadian Dads:

- 3.8 million Fathers with children under 18 living with them, as of 2011
- 29 Percentage of fathers who took parental leave in 2011
- 21 Percentage of male lone-parent families in 2011 (growth of single-parent families was more than twice as strong between 2006 and 2011 for men than for women: 16.2 per cent versus six per cent)
- 11 Percentage of two-parent families with a stay-at-home dad, as of 2010

Get Your Vote On

General Election Day in British Columbia will take place on **Saturday, November 15, 2014** from 8:00 am to 8:00 pm. On November 15, 2014, eligible voters will be voting across the province. For example, in Saanich we will elect a Mayor, eight Councillors and 11 School Trustees. You can vote if you are age 18, a Canadian citizen, a BC resident for at least six months immediately before the day you register to vote and a community resident for at least 30 days immediately before the day you register to vote. For those of us at UVic voting in this year's municipal election just got a bit easier. Thanks to a multi-year campaign by the UVSS, advance polls for Saanich, Oak Bay and Victoria are coming to UVic. Students, faculty, staff and other eligible voters can cast ballots on **Thursday, Nov. 6 from noon to 4 p.m. in the SUB Michele Pujol Room**.
