## FACULTY AND STAFF

Congratulations to Gerhard Brauer, EdD on the publication of his book *The Problem with Reading Hannah Arendt in English - How Poor Translation Can Impair the Reading and Understanding of Philosophy*.

Dr. Brauer argues that Hannah Arendt's self-translation of her book *The Human Condition*, from excellent German into poor English, significantly and unnecessarily compromised its readability. Arendt could have asked for editorial assistance with her English but clearly chose not to do so. On the basis of this premise, the author goes on to suggest that there may be a larger, as yet unremarked, educational problem in the English-speaking world: translated philosophy texts are assigned for reading without making students aware of the impact that translation can have on coherence. The naïve acceptance, by English-only readers, of incoherent wording as though it were a mark of stylistic eccentricity or semantic innovation, is defined as the translation-induced lionization of text or TILT. The problem is further exacerbated by an epidemic of infectious monolingualism in the English-speaking world. While a return to polyglotism in higher education, once a highly valued skill directly relevant to the reading and understanding of philosophical and literary works, would be ideal, the teaching of translation theory plus slow-reading is proposed as a more realistic and very feasible solution.

Jeff Barnett ('07) and instructor for HINF 351 and 591, has turned his master's project into a paper "The Impact of Privacy Legislation on Patient Care" that has been published in the *International Journal of Information Security and Privacy*. This article looks at how privacy legislation in Canada may interfere with patient care and the use of electronic health records. A review of the literature shows that legislation across Canada is not uniform and varies to the degree in which it addresses issues of privacy and confidentiality. What is not clear is what impact legislation has on the movement towards electronic health records? A case study was undertaken to look at a specific project involving the design of an electronic health record as a means of sharing information between physicians and prostate cancer patients. Through interviews with those associated with the project, it was clear that legislation itself was not a barrier. The problem was that the legislation was open to interpretation. The author hopes that an understanding of the issues raised by this article will lead to further discussion and research on this topic

Denis Protti is the first recipient of the new MacNaught-Taillon Award. He is shown above with Dennis Niebergal, President and CEO of Clinicare. Clinicare is the major contributor to the award and the bursary that goes with it.

The MacNaught-Taillon (M&T) Award has been established to honor the outstanding and lasting contributions of Don MacNaught and Serge Taillon to the Canadian health care system. Beginning in the mid-1980's in the Health Information Division of Health Canada, Don and Serge worked side by side to contribute their leadership in a spirit of cooperation to initiatives such as the National Health Information Council and the National Health Information Task Force. Their vision, stamina and perseverance contributed significantly to the realization of the Canadian Institute for Health Information in 1994. Whereas Don has been referred to as "Mr. Medicare" by former Health Minister Hon. Monique Begin, it is equally fitting to call Serge "Mr. Health Information". In summary they deserve much of the credit for transforming health informatics to useable health information in Canada.

The M&T award recognizes outstanding individual contributions to Canadian health care through emerging and exemplary leadership and mentorship in the advancement of health policy, health information and health informatics.

The award is accompanied by a bursary to support further training, research or education in health informatics and/or health policy that will be presented to an up and coming leader who will be designated at the discretion of the M&T Award recipient.
