Kinosaki Onsen Machi (Kinosaki Spa Town)

This course offers an intensive 15-day program (5 days at the University of Victoria, 10 days in Kinosaki International Arts Center,) of training in Japanese language and culture. The main objective is to advance sociolinguistic and communicative skills in Japanese, through authentic communicative activities with the local people in Kinosaki. The activities for the course may include: 1) pre-departure language and culture classes on campus; 2) classes to enhance communicative skills in Kinosaki; 3) practicum to use the Japanese language in work settings; 4) projects; and 5) visits to local schools and families.

[Field School Site in Japan]

Kinosaki International Arts Center (KIAC), Kinosaki , Toyooka City, Hyogo Prefecture.

KIAC is located in Kinosaki, famous spa town in Hyogo Prefecture. Kinosaki earned two stars in the 2012 Michelin Green Guide Japan. The town is renowned for its hot springs, beautiful scenery, as well as abundance of tasty and fresh food, such as Kobe beef and fresh seafood. KIAC's mandate is to promote internationalization through creative cooperation and collaboration between local people and international partners like UVic.

Tentative Course Syllabus

PAAS 397: Field School in Pacific and Asian Studies

Advanced Communication in Japanese (May-June, 2016) Instructor: H. Noro

This field school offers an intensive 15-day program (10 days in Kinosaki Onsen, 5 days at the University of Victoria campus) of training in Japanese language and culture. It is designed to develop students' linguistic, sociolinguistic, cultural, and intercultural skills. Training focuses on development of the ability to communicate in Japanese in interpersonal and intercultural settings.

The course modules include:

- 1) Advanced Spoken Japanese: Reviews and consolidates basic and intermediate Japanese skills essential for further advancement.
- 2) Formal Expressions for Japanese Interaction: Develops skills needed in coping with situations where students talk with people at different social levels.
- 3) Applied Japanese Skills: Develops skills in expressing and understanding Japanese in social context, by through skit creation and presentation.
- 4) Project Work: Enhances all four language skills by using them in pursuit of a small project on a topic of the student's own choosing. Investigation involves using Japanese for interviews, polls, or other methods of inquiry. A project is usually undertaken by groups of two to three students working in consultation with their instructor.
- 5) Proficiency Tests/Oral Interviews
 Proficiency tests and oral interviews are given at the beginning and the end of
 the course. By comparing the results, the instructor obtains a fairly reliable
 measure of student progress and program effectiveness.
- 6) Final Skit Presentation (happyo) in Japanese

At the end of the program, the students were expected to present their skits. Students select their own topics.

7) Final Self-Reflection Essay in Japanese
