COURSE DETAILS:

- ▷ DESCRIPTION: This is a course in the psychology of language that addresses questions related to the biological underpinnings of language, language comprehension (including speech perception, lexical knowledge, and sentence and discourse comprehension), language production (including lexical access, sentence planning, conversational interaction, and speech errors), and first language acquisition (a brief general introduction to the acquisition of phonology, morphology, and syntax and to word learning). [Note that LING 370B covers first language acquisition in detail.]
- ▷ COURSESPACES: This course has an accompanying website in CourseSpaces. You will find links to certain course readings, optional extra readings and other resources at coursespaces.uvic.ca, so please be sure to check it regularly. Lecture notes will not be posted in CourseSpaces, so be sure to attend class, take notes, and ask questions.

▷ COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

- In-class participation exercises using i>clicker, worth 10% of your course mark.
- Journal Article Summaries (see below), worth 20% of your course mark, due on Thursday, December 1st.
- Term test #1, worth 15% of your course mark, on Thursday, October 13th. (60 minutes, multiple choice and short answer format)
- Term test #2, worth 15% of your course mark, on Tuesday, November 15th (60 minutes, multiple choice and short answer format)
- Final exam, worth 40% of your course mark, during the Final Exam Period (2 hours, multiple choice and short answer format)

▷ i>CLICKER PARTICIPATION EXERCISES: At almost every class, there will be questions on current readings and lecture material that you will answer by the use of your i>clicker. You will receive full credit for correct answers and partial credit for incorrect answers, i.e., credit simply for participation. If you miss class or forget your i>clicker, you get no credit for that session. **Please bring your i>clicker to every class.**

▷ JOURNAL ARTICLE SUMMARIES: The purposes of this assignment are:

- to read current refereed journal articles that address research questions in psycholinguistics;
- to extract the main points from the article: the authors' claims, psycholinguistic methods used to collect data, and how the results provide support for the claims;
- to write a one-page summary of each article that anyone could read and find out what contribution the article has made to the field of psycholinguistics.

Detailed instructions will be provided on a separate handout.

▷ TERM TESTS: The term tests will be in class on Thursday, October 13th and Tuesday, November 15th. Any student who misses a test (1) must call or leave a message **prior** to the test indicating he/she is unable to attend, (2) must have a valid reason (personal tragedy or illness), and (3) must provide supporting documentation, such as a medical

certificate with the relevant date or a detailed written explanation. If these conditions are met, then the value of the missed term test will be added to the value of the final exam. If these conditions are not met, a score of zero will be recorded for that component of the course.

- ▷ **FINAL EXAM:** The final exam is two hours and will be held during the Final Examination Period. It will be based on the entire course. Please note that the timing of the final exam is controlled by the University, and not by the Department of Linguistics nor by course instructors. It could be on any day between December 5th and 19th.

The final exam is an essential requirement of the course, which means that you are required to write the final exam in order to pass the course, even if you have a grade of 50% or higher based on the term tests and assignments. In other words, failure to write the final exam will result in a failing grade, even where a final grade of 50% or higher is achieved.

- ▷ **DEFERRED STATUS:** If you miss the final exam because of injury, family or personal affliction, or illness, see the regulations in the 2016-2017 Undergraduate Calendar on how to apply for deferred status (web.uvic.ca/calendar2016-09/undergrad/info/regulations/concessions.html).
