When a registration block is to be instituted, the Registrar will issue an email notice to the student and will copy the Dean, or designate, of her or his Faculty of registration offering an opportunity for the student to respond, in writing and within 14 calendar days, to explain this registration history. The Registrar and the Dean or designate will review the student's explanation and will determine if the registration block is imposed, the student may submit an appeal to the Senate Committee on Admission, Re-registration and Transfer (c/o Undergraduate Admissions and Records).
