#### Program admission requirements

- 1. Admissibility to the university. Undergraduate Admissions Services determines eligibility for admission to UVic.
- 2. An acceptable undergraduate Bachelor's degree recognized by Undergraduate Admissions Services.
- 3. 3 units of approved English literature (or English literature and academic composition).
- 4. Demonstrated competency in written English (grade requirement; see page two).
- 5. See the three grade point average (GPA) requirements described on page two.
- 6. Approved academic studies in one or two teachable subjects relevant to the BC curriculum. A list of available subjects is provided on the website below.
- 7. Applicants must satisfy the experience requirement described on the program website below. Eligible applicants may also be invited to attend an interview.
- 8. For current applicant selection criteria, please see the program website below. This is subject to change for future intakes; please see the program website updated annually each fall for the upcoming intake.

Notes

- A 1.5-unit course (equivalent to 3-4 credits at most institutions) meets for at least 3 hours per week for 13 weeks (one term).
- At UVic, 'upper-level' refers to 300 and/or 400-level courses normally taken in third and fourth year after introductory studies.

#### Teachable subject area: Social Studies

The BC Ministry of Education defines social studies as "a multidisciplinary subject that draws from the social sciences and humanities to study human interaction and natural and social environments." In BC secondary schools, social studies may be offered as: Social Studies 8-11 and various grade 12 classes including 20<sup>th</sup> Century World History, Asian Studies, Indigenous Studies, Comparative Cultures, Economic Theory, Human or Physical Geography, Political Studies, etc. Curriculum documents may be viewed on the BC Ministry of Education website.

Courses will be accepted in history, geography, political science, sociology, anthropology, and economics if they are approved as being related to the BC social studies curriculum. For example, UVic's ECON 321 The Economic History of Canada is approved but not ECON 310B Competition Policy. We will also accept social studies related courses from Canadian studies, Asian & Pacific studies, gender/women's studies, Indigenous studies (other than education-related), urban studies and environmental studies if they are related to history, geography, political science, sociology, anthropology, or economics. A limited number of courses from classical/Greek & Roman studies, criminology, international relations, law, or religious studies may be accepted on a case-by-case basis.

12 units, including <u>9 units upper-level</u>, are needed to qualify for social studies as one of two teachable subject areas <u>or</u>
 15 units upper-level are needed to qualify with a single social studies teachable subject area.

<sup>1</sup> Examples of acceptable Canadian social studies courses are UVic's CS 102; ECON 100; GEOG 306; HSTR \*230A, HSTR \*230B, HSTR 322A, 327B, 328, 329B, 330A; POLI 101, 201; SOCI 103. \*Starred courses are recommended. Canadian literature, art history, or other fine arts topics are not approved (ex. CS 101).

The focus of Canadian social studies courses must be on Canada and the Canadian experience. Courses using Canadian examples as a means to explore a discipline will not be accepted (ex. introductory sociology). Cultural studies courses will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.

<sup>2</sup> An approved Canadian history course will satisfy both the Canadian social studies and history requirements. An approved Canadian geography course will satisfy both the Canadian social studies and geography requirements. Keep in mind the overall total number of units required, as above.
