Charlotte Ross successfully defends her dissertation Adult Silent Speakers: A nīhithaw Perspective


On July 30th, Charlotte Ross presented her doctoral work to a packed room of colleagues, family, and ILR scholars, with over 50 in attendance in person and online. Charlotte's study focussed on adults who were raised hearing and understanding their Indigenous language but are not speakers, commonly considered 'silent speakers'. While the emphasis was on adult nīhithaw silent speakers, the findings can be generalized to other Indigenous language groups where silent speakers exist. This dissertation contributes to increasing our understanding of how best to support silent speakers to re-engage with speaking their language.




Course Opportunities
