

**Building Connections: Orientation Day for new PDPP students** 

#### The Department of Indigenous Education hosted the new Post-Degree Professional Program (PDPP) students for orientation on September 3, 2025. This was a wonderful day that started with an introduction to Circle and some local protocols facilitated by Frank

Conibear, an experienced educator and member of the Lyackson First Nation. During this morning session each member of the cohort had an opportunity to introduce themselves and explore their goals for themselves and expectations from this program. This became an opportunity for sharing and bonding, meeting a goal of the orientation day. Following the morning session, we continued to build connection among members of the cohort and the Indigenous Education Department. During lunch we were joined by staff and faculty supporting the program.

In the afternoon, Jean-Paul Restoule gave an overview of the program, and staff and faculty introduced themselves and their role in support of the post-degree teacher education program. This was followed by each student giving a brief introduction and rich discussion took place through a question-and-answer time along with informal sharing.


