Our team presented a number of posters from various projects underway in the Language, Literacy and Learning Lab in the section for Educational and School Psychology. Lauren Goegan presented a poster titled: "Evaluating the Merit of Extended Time as an Accommodation for University Students with Learning Disabilities: Maximum Potential or Differential Boost?" The poster highlighted initial findings from her thesis.
