

5. Climate Change Report – (Kimiko West)

- 130 public sector organizations are responsible for preparing a complete and accurate inventory of their Greenhouse Gas Emissions every year.
- Under the Climate Change Accountability Act, all provincial public sector organizations must achieve carbon neutrality to assist the province in reaching its mandated goal of reducing greenhouse gas emissions by 60% below 2007 levels by 2040 and 80% by 2050.
- What we measure and report on: six greenhouse gases: carbon dioxide; methane; nitrous oxide; sulphur hexafluoride; perfluorocarbons and hydrofluorocarbons.
- How we measure these emissions: building emissions; mobile emissions and paper emissions.
- UVic has also set targets and goals to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in its Climate and Sustainability Action Plan.

Cadboro Bay Residents' Association, Barry Andruschak

- The Association is having a challenging time recruiting new members and is taking a new approach by hosting information sessions and discussions in the community that could be of interest to a wide audience.
- The Association hosted a great meet-and-greet / info session in May at the University Club with UVic Director of Campus Planning and Sustainability, Mike Wilson, and CRD Housing Chair and Saanich Councillor Zac de Vries. In April, the Association hosted an information session with Mayor Dean Murdock and Chief of Police Dean Duthie.
- Additional events are being planned for the summer.
- The Association is taking a strong interest in the District of Saanich approving the restart of the
 Ecologically Significant Areas Development Permit Area which could affect private property rights in
 Saanich. The Association is actively providing voluntary stewardship in Knockson Park and private land so
 property owners and residents of Cadboro bay can pre-emptively alter Saanich's need to infringe on
 private property.

Quadra Cedar Hill Community Association, John Schmuk

- The Association is waiting on the release by Saanich of the interim report of the Quadra-McKenzie Study (QMS). This document will provide the blueprint for a major wave of densification in the community.
- Lots of development applications currently in progress including:

- Nellie McClung Library redevelopment which is now going to be 18 storeys.
- Abstract developments at Quadra and Palmer; McKenzie and Rainbow; Rainbow and Seven Oaks; Quadra and Tattersall.
- o Glasgow 50 unit rental
- McKenzie and Saanich Rd
- o McKenzie and Annie 126 strata & rental
- Alder and Cloverdale 278 units (two buildings)
- Lots more expected (Lumberworld; St Peter's Church; St Peter's and Quadra; Quadra and Inverness; Cook St Medical site; second Quadra and Tattersall).
- 1555 McKenzie (former medical building); University Heights and Loblaws Mayfair
- Community Association succession: The Association's current President Susan Haddon has been in her position for nine years. Prior to that, John was President for five years and now in 16th year on the executive. Chris Bartlett has been on the board longer than John. It is very difficult to recruit new members who will be future leaders. Most other CA's are having the same issues.
- Rutledge Park will have a grand opening for the new water park on June 24th. Students from Cloverdale Traditional School will participate. QCHCA has raised funds for this.
- Music in the Park at Rutledge Park on Aug 13th will feature "Shenanigans". Only the one date for QCHCA this year to allow another CA to participate.
- All candidate's meeting expected in late September for the Victoria-Swan Lake riding.

Camosun Community Association, Meralin Young

- The Friends of Bowker Creek Society are organizing Biodiversity Day Sunday, Sept 22. CCA will have a table. The location was to be at the Lansdowne Middle School South triangle by Bowker Creek, but SD 61 wants rent for the day. CCA does not have the money, so the location may have to change.
- CCA will be doing a membership drive over the summer on the website and Facebook page.
- Situation regarding the closure of the Shelbourne Medical Clinic. There was an online meeting on June 14 with Dr. Jonathon Kerr from Comox about his experience setting up a taskforce to recruit doctors to Comox. They have acquired 45 doctors since 2020 and they will have 0 unattached patients by the end of 2024. Attendees at the meeting were Murray Rankin MLA Oak Bay Gordon Head, a concerned citizen, Lisa Timmons President of CCA and Leigh Urquhart CCA board member. Murray Rankin will reach out to the Mayors of Oak Bay and Saanich about setting up a similar task force here. Dr. Kerr will advise.
- Work on one townhouse development at Allenby and Richmond will begin this summer.
- The CCA met with the developer and some neighbours about another townhouse development at Dean and Cochrane. The development application has not been made to Saanich yet.
- Abstract Development at the corner of Shelbourne and McRae has broken ground.
- The Association is concerned about the province cutting back community consultation on development.

Community Association of Oak Bay, Bill Trott

- The Association hosted a dementia friendly talk that was very successful.
- Earlier this month, the Association hosted an event with Ryan Moran on the topic of truth and reconciliation.
- In the fall, the Association host an all-candidates meeting.
- The Association is looking for someone to speak to densification and trees.
- The Association participated in the Oak Bay Tea Party parade.
- Bowker Creek Brush-up will be on August 11.
- Work is taking place on the digital Oak Bay Green Map.

Mt. Tolmie Community Association, Ryon Bateman

• The Association has been asked to comment on the cannabis store being considered for University Heights. This is the third cannabis store in the area.

- Saanich Council adopted the new OCP. The biggest complaint from the community is regarding the elimination of Local Area Plans and that most people didn't even know this was happening.
- There is deep concern about what is happening in terms of development and if the community is being considered at all in any of what is being proposed.

Gordon Head Community Association, Joan Wenman

- The Association has a new member who has already helped streamline promotion by connecting the newsletter to their social media platforms.
- The survey for the University District was shared widely by the Association in the community.
- The board has spoken out about their disapproval regarding the proposed Abstract development on Feltham and Gordon Head Road to Council.
- Traffic and infrastructure issues are common topics / concerns the Board raises when they speak to the Mayor.
- Majestic Park, music in the park will be on July 9.
- Concern that none of the housing that is currently being planned will actually be affordable (except for the Nellie McClung development).

REFINE THE DRAFT CONCEPT

Refine the draft concept with input from all partners and stakeholders and align the concept with the current market to ensure financial visibility.

Based on the findings of the engagement process and site analysis, a unaque vision will be developed for the site, to be achieved through the master plan.




DEVELOP A CONCEPT
