It was while reading an article on the Conversation Club that Kathy wondered if this was a way she could give back to her Family Housing community. Kathy approached Family Centre staff and has been helping to run the Conversation Club since.

Kathy grew up in Calgary. She studied English as an undergrad and went on to do a Masters in Education. She and her husband then spent seven years travelling overseas. They both taught English as a second language, mainly in Japan. Kathy says that of all the places she has travelled to Japan remains her favourite, perhaps because she lived there for four years. However, she also confessed a fondness for Italy, mainly since she loves the food. When Kathy is not busy teaching and taking care of Elia, she loves to snowboard and hike. She also runs a book club for moms. When asked to name her favourite book, Kathy had to think for a while, but then decided on Pride and Prejudice by Jane Austen.

I asked Kathy to tell me a bit about the Conversation club. Typically there are between five and eight people there, so far they have all been women. One of the things that Kathy loves is the fact that the group is so diverse, mothers and grandmothers from Egypt, Libya, China, Mexico, Japan, Russia, Saudi Arabia and Bangladesh. All of them drawn together to learn to communicate more efficiently in English. The Conversation Club is very informal. There is always tea to drink and a topic to discuss. So far they have discussed starting a conversation and small talk, employment and jobs, personality, health and wellness, and culture. Mixed in with the theme the women share challenges and tips and talk about their culture. Kathy speaks of the club with great enthusiasm and passion, sentiments shared by the other participants I'm sure. 2006 Census Highlights~Victoria Census Metropolitan Area

I had an opportunity to attend a workshop presented by Statistics Canada this fall, and I would like to share some informational highlights of the Victoria Census. The world's population is over six billion. Between 1960 and 2000 it's population nearly doubled. According to the UN's assump-

tion, it will not double again, but will peak at around nine billion mid-way through the 21st century. After that it will begin to decline quite rapidly. Within this global context, Canada will show similar population trends. Our fertility rate has already fallen to 1.5 children per household, and is moving towards an even lower level among European nations.

What has been happening in our communities? If you do nothing now, what is our community's population likely to be in 10 years? According to the 2006 census results, the population of Greater Victoria was 330,088, and was the 15th largest Census Metropolitan Area in Canada and the 14th fastest growing city between 2001 and 2006. Nearly two in three residents in Greater Victoria lived in the largest three municipalities: Saanich (108,265), City of Victoria (78,057), and Langford (22,459), followed by Oak Bay, Esquimalt, Central Saanich, and Colwood. Everywhere an aging population is a common trend, Greater Victoria was the third oldest metropolitan city with 17.8% aged 65 and over and had the highest proportion (6.4%) of very elderly people (80 and over). The median age in Greater Victoria was 35.9, in 1996, 38.4 in 2001, and 40.8 in 2006.

In 2006, close to one in five (19.1%) residents in Victoria were foreign born. This was slightly lower than the Canadian average (19.8%). Immigrants came from a variety of countries as the table and numbers below show.

For top mother tongues in Greater Victoria is: 1. English (85.3%), 2. Chinese (2.9%), 3. French (2.0%), 4. German (1.6%), 5. Punjabi (1.2%), 6. Dutch (0.7%), 7. Spanish (0.7%), 8. Portuguese (0.5%), 9. Japanese (0.5%), 10. Tagalog (0.5%). Among ethnic and visible minority census respondees, Victoria showed a strong presence of British heritage compared to the other metropolitan cities.
