#### **Finding Childcare**

Finding childcare is one of the most stressful parts of being a student and a parent. Here's what I've tried and learned in my two years as a student mom.

#### UVic Daycare

Get on the waitlist as early as possible. The UVic childcare websites advises that waitlists for preschool-age children can be up to a year and a half. If you are expecting, you may put your child on the waitlist as soon as you know you are pregnant. Call the daycare regularly to check your spot on the waitlist and keep them updated about your student status.

#### Child Care Resource and Referral

The CCRR (<a href="http://www.childcarevictoria.org/">http://www.childcarevictoria.org/</a>) provides resources for parents in Victoria. They have a list of childcare providers and offer workshops, newsletters, and more.

#### Nanny / Babysitter

Many families hire a nanny or babysitter to care for their child(ren) in their home. You may be able to find a nanny by speaking with others in Family Housing. I also found babysitters by talking with fellow students and advertising on an internal student email list. Many students are happy to work for a few hours a week—particularly students in the education program. 
#### Dayhome

A dayhome is similar to a daycare, but is usually run by a mom who takes care of a few children as well as her own in her home. Dayhomes can be registered with the CCRR. You may be able to find a mom in Family Housing who is willing to care for your children while you are in classes; this worked for me one semester. Talk to your neighbours or staff at the Family Centre.

#### Preschool

Preschool offers part-time care for children aged two and a half to five. Research preschools around UVic to see which programs are suitable for your child(ren). However, registration for many preschools happens long before registration for undergraduate classes at UVic, which may cause scheduling problems for you. If you are a BC resident, there is a subsidy available from the government to help with preschool fees.

If you cannot get your children into a daycare, then some flexibility and creativity will help you find childcare. UVic also offers a Childcare Bursary to help students with daycare, dayhome or babysitting costs (you can apply each semester). Good luck with finding the right childcare for your family!
