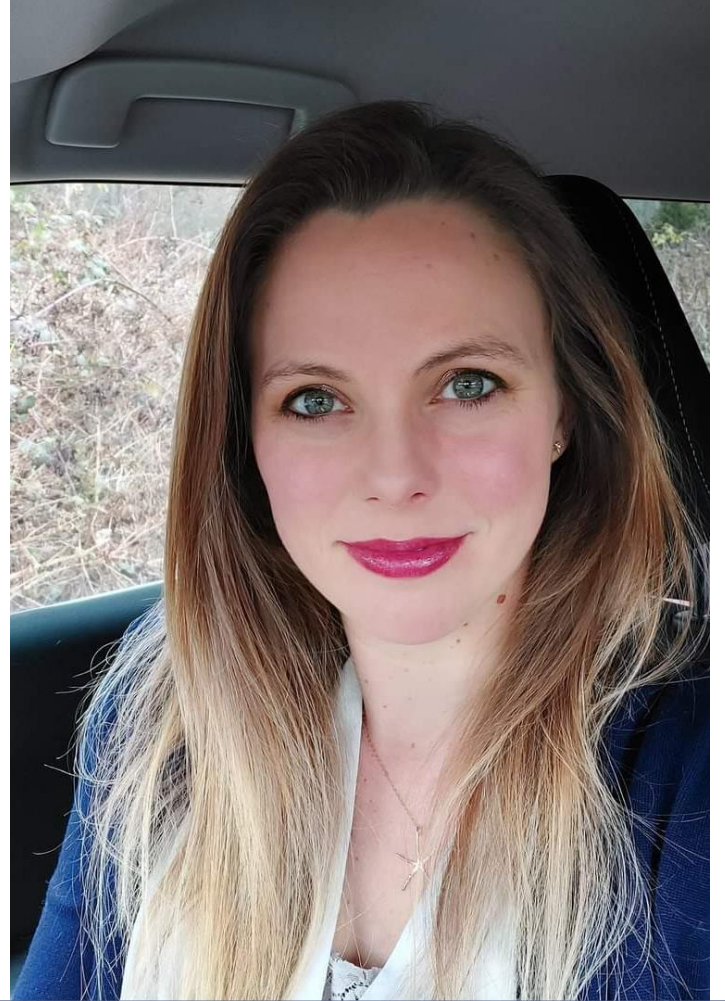


KAIJA GRIFFITHS

I currently work as a residential youth care worker, and in Government at the organization I did my 4th year practicum with. My long-term aspiration is to do more therapeutic one-on-one work.



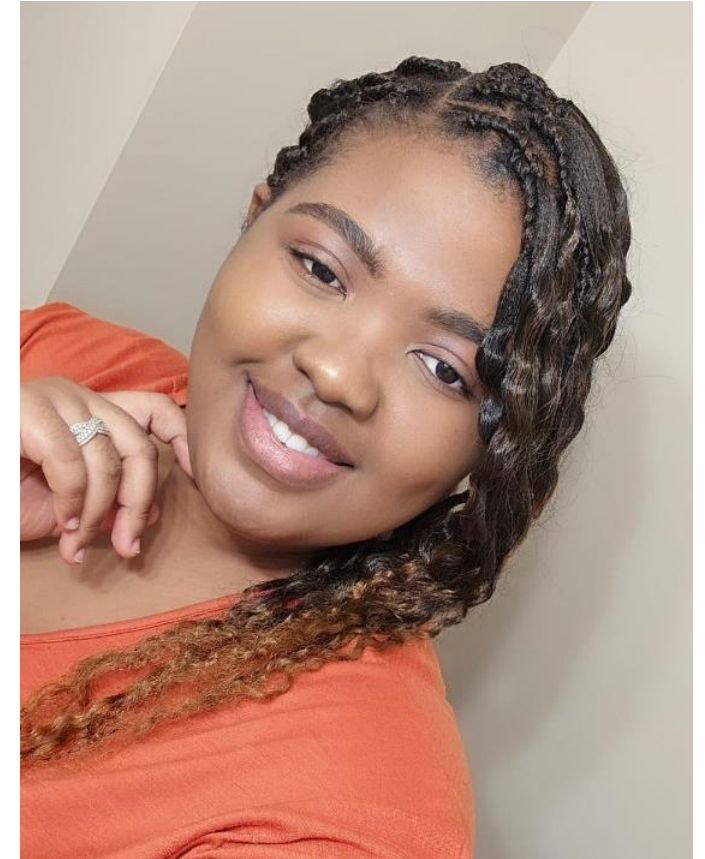
NOBUKHOSI (KHOSI) MHLANGA
