Dr. Frederick de Armas is Chair of Romance Languages and Literatures, Andrew W. Mellon Professor in Humanities, and Professor of Spanish and Comparative Literature at the University of Chicago. He is Vice-President of the Cervantes Society of America, and a three-time recipient of the National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowships. In his presentations at the University of Victoria, Dr. de Armas will address Cervantes' self-representation as a failed author, and discuss the relation of Cervantes' *Don Quixote* with the classical epic, Italian Renaissance painting, and the visual arts in general.
