She has been the coordinator of the Department of Comparative Literature at the Faculty of Philosophy and Letters at UNAM (Mexico) where she is a full-time professor. She is the author of the novels *La corte de los ilusos* (1995), *El paraíso que fuimos* (2002) and *Alta infidelidad* (2006), and the collections of short stories *Amores que matan* (1996) and *Optimistas* (2006). Her book of essays *América sin americanismos* (1997) was awarded the Florence Fishbaum Award.
