Course objective:

I hope that you will find this course to be enjoyable and intellectually stimulating! Existentialism is a movement that has had a profound influence on Western Philosophy and culture. This course provides an introduction to the methodology of Existentialism, and to its major themes. The course includes fascinating selections of readings by the following key figures in Existentialism: Søren Kierkegaard, Friedrich Nietzsche, Martin Heidegger, and Jean-Paul Sartre. There will be discussion on philosophical problems that arise from the attempt to explain human existence, consciousness and freedom. The course material is designed to be accessible to those with little or no background in Philosophy, but will certainly be engaging for those with background in Philosophy.

Lectures and class attendance: Class attendance is mandatory in the Department of Philosophy. Note that lectures will often introduce concepts and figures that are not mentioned in class readings. Examination and test questions are based on lecture content. Lectures will sometimes be mixed with discussion and in-class writing activities. Well maintained notes will provide an invaluable support to your successful completion of the tests, in class exercises, and final exam.

Policy on technology use in class: Please show respect for your fellow class mates and for your Instructor by turning off phones before coming to class.
