Course objective: I hope that you will find this class to be intellectually stimulating and enjoyable. Philosophy of mind is one of the most fascinating areas of philosophical inquiry. The aim of the course is to provide an **introduction** to some central and current philosophical problems concerning mentality and consciousness. Our focus will concern questions including the following: What is a mental state? Is a mental state identical to a brain state? Do some computer programs think? Other topics to be explored include perception, agency/freedom of the will, and personal identity. This course is developed to be accessible to those with no pre-requisite course in philosophy, and yet will certainly be highly stimulating for those with background knowledge in the discipline of Philosophy. Lectures are designed to make the reading material accessible and understandable to students.

Lectures and class attendance: Class attendance is mandatory in the Department of Philosophy. Note that lectures will almost always introduce concepts and figures that are not mentioned in class readings. Examination and test questions are based on lecture content. Lectures will sometimes be mixed with in-class writing activities. Well-maintained notes will provide an invaluable support to your successful completion of the tests, in class exercises, and final exam.

Policy on technology use in class: Please show respect for your fellow class mates and for your Instructor by turning off phones before coming to class. Studies consistently indicate that laptop use negatively impacts the learning and performance of nearby students. If you choose to use a laptop, please do not cause distraction.
