Phil 591: Research Methods Seminar Syllabus

Course Description:

The course has two principal objectives: (1) to develop and hone research and teaching skills needed to complete a graduate degree in philosophy and (2) to explore developments and issues in philosophy related to the research interests of the faculty. Throughout the term, faculty will visit the class to lead discussions of issues that arise in their area of research and talk about their own research methodologies. We will discuss readings related to departmental colloquia, and in the last few weeks we will discuss articles and topics of your choice. The course will, therefore, cover a wide range of philosophical topics in diverse areas of philosophy. However, students can write their term paper on a topic that reflects their own philosophical research interests.

Course Logistics:

Graded Items: Work for the course consists of 1 term paper proposal, 1 term paper, 1 presentation of a draft of the term paper, 1 commentary on a paper draft, and regular engagement. The engagement grade will consist in 10 written reflections, submitted on Brightspace on the week's material. These will be approximately one double-spaced page, and can reflect on either the readings or the in-class discussion, due at the end of the week.

Term paper proposals will be approximately 1-2 pages, plus a bibliography of 3-5 items that the paper will engage with. Presentations and commentaries will take place on a date after the end of classes in a mini-conference style. Students will be assigned as commentators on each others' papers, and both presentations and commentaries will be evaluated.
