

Course Description

In this course we will work to understand four philosophical traditions in ethics: utilitarianism, Kantian ethics, contractarianism and Aristotelian virtue ethics. We will begin with a classic text in each tradition and move through contemporary attempts to critique, develop and apply these four conceptions of ethics. We will consider the problems that motivate the accounts and the reasoning that supports them. Just as importantly, we will put all of them to the test of practical application. Among the applied topics we will grapple with are a duty to aid people in need, the treatment of non-human animals, promises, abortion, assisted suicide, the consumer lifestyle, free speech, journalistic ethics and our impact on the environment. Throughout, we will be asking whether any of these approaches to ethics help us to understand what makes an action right or wrong or help us to answer the pressing questions of what kind of people we should be and how we ought to live our lives together.
