Course Description

In this course we will attempt to develop a solid understanding of four prominent normative ethical theories: contractarianism, Kantian ethics, consequentialism and contractualism. We will begin with a classic text in each tradition and move through contemporary attempts to explain, develop and critique these different conceptions of ethics. We will try to understand the intuitions and problems that motivate these accounts, the reasoning that supports them and some of the issues they have yet to resolve. Throughout, we will be asking whether any of these theories help us to understand what makes an action right or wrong or help us to answer the pressing questions of what kind of people we should be and how we ought to live our lives.
