Course Description & Intended Learning Outcomes

From the early 6th century BCE to the 2nd century AD, a succession of philosophers lay the groundwork for philosophical and scientific thought in the Western world. These philosophers were among the first in the Western tradition to think rigorously and precisely about central issues in metaphysics, epistemology, ethics, political philosophy, and even philosophy of language. This course introduces students to some of the ideas, arguments and methods of investigation of these thinkers. After a brief examination of some Presocratic philosophers (Thales, Xenophanes, Heraclitus, Parmenides, Zeno, Democritus, and Protagoras), the lion's share of the course will be devoted to three profoundly influential thinkers: Socrates, Plato, and Aristotle. We will end with a brief examination of three schools of Hellenistic philosophy: Epicureanism, Stoicism, and Skepticism. We will read both primary texts by these thinkers as well as a scholarly commentary on them; our goal will be the articulation of a clear and precise account of their views, arguments, and methods of investigation.

Course Texts

Required:

- (1) [AP] Christopher Shields, *Ancient Philosophy: A Contemporary Introduction*, 2nd ed. (Routledge, 2012);
- (2) [OR] Online readings, which will be made available through Brightspace.

Course Evaluation

Students' grades will be based upon:

(1) Take-Home Tests

Value: 1st = 30%, 2nd = 33% (= 63%)

Assignment: Students will have 24-hours to answer questions online covering course material.

Due dates: see course schedule.

(2) Final Essay

Value: 34%

Assignment: Students will complete a final essay of 1500-2500 words.

Essay topics will be provided two weeks before the due date

(3) Participation Grade

Value: 3%

Assignment: Students will be awarded a grade on the basis of their participation in the class; this includes, but is not limited to, attending lectures.
