Course Content.

Introduction to language used by Deaf community throughout North America; no prior knowledge required. This introductory course covers the essentials and fundamentals of American Sign Language, including structure and its features such as grammar. It promotes the means to achieve culturally and linguistically appropriate everyday interaction. Additionally, the course provides an insight into the Deaf community and Deaf culture in Canada, as well as in the United States. Importantly, it is conducted entirely in American Sign Language (ASL) from the very first day and throughout the course. Being immersed in the use of ASL for 4 hours a week promotes and maximises language acquisition and comprehension. Some insights of Deaf communities and culture in Canada, United States and around the world will be offered. A variety of materials such as gestures, signs, drawings and role-play situations will be utilised. NOTE: The ASL program does not permit course challenges.
