#### MINI-UNIVERSITY SUMMER CAMP

An immersive experience for Indigenous youth

For one week every summer, UVic's classrooms, dorms and outdoor spaces become home to teenage visitors from BC and the Northwest Territories. A week packed with academic, creative, cultural and social activities provides an immersive opportunity for participants to experience the authentic UVic student experience.

Beginning in the summer of 2008, the Mini-U Summer Camp has made a significant impact, totaling 315 participants in grades 9 - 12 as of 2025. Among this group, 36 participants have either attended or are currently enrolled at UVic. This demonstrates the efficacy of the Mini-U Summer camp in exposing youth to the UVic experience, while contributing to their pursuit of higher education.

The impact that Mini-U has on Indigenous youth is evident in the many smiles you will see throughout this photo book.








# PET CAFE Monday July 7th

an hour with the dogs on campus.
















#### STEM WORKSHOP



As a group, campers travelled to the arcade in Downtown Victoria. This was a fun and interactive way for students to build connections with each other while exploring virtual reality.
















# PLANT WALK WITH J.B. WILLIAMS THURSDAY JULY 10TH
