Our particular areas of strength are:



LLM in Law and Society

Program duration:

- Minimum 1 year (three terms) enrolment.
- Maximum five years (15 terms) enrolment to program completion.
- Time to completion averages 16 months (4 terms) to two years (6 terms).

PHD in Law and Society

Program duration:

- Minimum 1 year (three terms) enrolment.
- Maximum seven years (21 terms) enrolment to program completion.
- Time to completion averages 3 years (9 terms) to five years (15 terms).

Residency:

Our aim is to build a cohesive community, and to support the development of your dissertation.

- First year must be completed full-time, on-campus, in Victoria.
- Full-time attendance is required.
