

PROGRAM & COURSE NOTES

Course requirements with an asterisk (*) have associated details; consult the program entry in the Academic Calendar for more information. It is your responsibility to ensure you are informed about all supplemental information related to courses, as they apply to your program, including prerequisites.

FACULTY & UNIVERSITY REQUIREMENTS

In addition to the listed courses, you must satisfy all requirements for the Faculty of Science, as well as complete at least 30 of the minimum 60 required units at UVic. Within these 60 units, 21 units must be upper-level (300/400-level) courses, and 18 of those 21 units must be taken at UVic.

ACADEMIC WRITING REQUIREMENT

If you have not already satisfied UVic's Academic Writing Requirement (AWR), you will need to complete one of ATWP 135, ENSH 101, ENSH 102, ENSH 103, ATWP 110, or another approved course. Some programs require these courses in addition to the AWR

DECLARING YOUR PROGRAM

Students are normally expected to request to declare their academic program at the end of first year.

Declared students have access to a CAPP report for tracking graduation requirements.

Not sure what courses to take to round out your first year? After selecting courses required for your program, you'll likely be left with a number of elective slots to fill.

Choosing electives can seem daunting—there are many courses, offered by many academic units, from which to choose. The Faculties of Humanities and Social Sciences have grouped together courses into a number of thematic areas to help you as you explore your options. You can find these electives on our Humanities electives and Social Sciences electives pages. These courses are appropriate for first- and second-year students (or above), from any faculty.

Note: You can also review a complete list of <u>100- and 200-level courses without prerequisites</u> if you would prefer to search by faculty and unit, rather than by theme.

University success

The following courses help support your academic progress. Taking an English course can help improve writing at all levels, while ED-D 101 will help you develop learning strategies for overall success at university.

- ATWP 101 Fundamentals of Academic Literacy
 - Focus is on sentence and paragraph-level skills and basic essay writing;
 recommended for students who want extra support as they prepare for university academic writing
- ATWP 135 Academic Reading and Writing *
- ED-D101 Learning Strategies for University Success
- ENSH 101 Themes in Literature * (formerly ENGL 146)
- ENSH 102 Literature in Action* (formerly ENGL 147)
- ENSH 202 Technical Communications, Written and Verbal (formerly ENGL 225)

Courses with an asterisk also satisfy UVic's Academic Writing Requirement.
