Victoria – what to expect

Geography

- Small island on west coast of Canada
- Beaches, mountains, and forests
- About 400,000 people in Greater Victoria

Climate

- Mild weather year-round
- Dry summers, rainy winters
- Snow is very rare

UVic

- Located 20 mins from downtown Victoria
- Spacious, green campus
- About 20,000 students



Packing and Prep

What to pack:

- Medications: <u>3-month supply</u>
- Medical and vaccination records
- Payment methods
- Identification documents
- Driver's license
- International Driver's Permit (optional)
- Weather-appropriate clothes
- Specialty toiletries
- Reminder of home



Packing and Prep

What not to pack:

- Parkas, snow boots
- <u>Large amounts of cash</u>
- Agricultural food items
- General housewares



Centre for Accessible Learning (CAL)

CAL provides support and accommodations for students with disabilities and chronic health conditions to ensure equitable access to education.

Get prepared:

- Relevant medical history
- Diagnoses (if applicable)
- Accommodation history at your home school/university
- Registration deadline: February 28

Arriving in Victoria

Most students will arrive to Victoria by:

- <u>Plane</u>: Victoria International Airport, YYJ
- Ferry: Vancouver (Tsawwassen Terminal) to Victoria (Swartz Bay Terminal)

Services at the Victoria airport:

Currency exchange, Wi-Fi, Visitor Information

Transit options to where you are staying:

- BC Transit Bus (\$6 for day pass, cash)
- <u>BC Connector</u> (Vancouver airport to Victoria)
- Uber, Lyft (set up app before arriving)
- Taxi (~ \$75, cash/credit airport or Ferry terminal)



Getting Around

Student bus pass (U-pass)

- Set up UMO app or card
- Activate your benefit code
- Pass starts January 1

Other useful tools for getting around:

- BC Transit Trip Planner
- Google Maps

Other types of transport:

- <u>Biking:</u> maps and bike loan program
- <u>Driving:</u> check <u>car shares</u>, <u>parking</u> information

- Activate your <u>U-pass benefit code</u>
- Check your <u>UVic Online Tools</u> for handy links and resources
- Check out the <u>Student Union Building (the SUB)</u>

- Explore Victoria!





On-Campus Housing

Move in:

- Expect an email with information and notice of a special midyear orientation to get you connected to your communities.

Off-Campus Housing

Living outside of the campus can be a great part of your experience!

Things to consider:

- Location/commute to UVic
- Rental prices
- Grocery stores, amenities, bills
- Access to bus routes

Types of housing:

- Rent an apartment or house (tenant)
- Share with roommates (occupant)
- Rent a room in landlord's home (boarder)

Short-term Accommodation

Consider securing short-term accommodations for your first few days in Victoria to leave time to find a place.

Options include: <u>hotels</u>, <u>Airbnb</u>, <u>VRBO</u> and <u>hostels</u>. Costs vary depending on location, room type and length of stay. Food is usually not included.


Sub-leasing

Some students may prefer subleasing a unit, which is temporarily renting from someone who has a lease on a dwelling.

Health Insurance Overview

Mandatory Temporary Medical Insurance (MTMI) / GuardMe

What is GuardMe?

- Temporary primary health insurance for new international students
- Covers basic and emergency medical care, including dental emergencies
- Keeps you safe while you wait for MSP

Official coverage dates for Spring:

January 1 through April 30

Grace period:

December 18 - 31

MTMI fee: CAD \$265 paid with your tuition

GuardMe

Look out for an email from GuardMe mid December to log in to your account!

BC Medical Service Plan (MSP)

- Mandatory health insurance for every person who resides in BC
- Students staying in BC for 6 months or longer who hold a valid study permit must apply
- Primary health insurance for entire stay in BC
- Apply online with Health Insurance BC (HIBC) when you arrive in BC
- Wait period of approximately 3 months (GuardMe expires after 4 months)

Join the <u>BC MSP drop-in</u> to get assistance with applying for BC MSP on **January 6, 2026** from 10 am – 3pm.



BC MSP Timeline

- As soon as you arrive in BC: apply online
- 3 months after arriving: wait period complete
- 1 month after applying: receive a letter of confirmation stating coverage dates
- When your coverage begins: receive BC Services Card (non-photo) with Personal Health Number (PHN)
- One month after coverage begins: receive first invoice CAD \$75/month payable to BC government's Revenue Services.

Important: your MSP expires when your study permit expires. If you have applied for a new study permit, you must update MSP to ensure continuous coverage.



Extended Health & Dental

What are extended benefits?

- Partial coverage for medical services not included in primary health insurance
- Subsidized by student union membership
- Doesn't replace primary health insurance

Coverage includes:

- Prescriptions
- Dental care
- Vision care
- Mental health: counselling, psychiatry, & more
- Physical health: chiropractic, acupuncture, physiotherapy, & more
- Gender affirming care

Dates: January 1-August 31

Renews automatically each year by Fall term





Vaccinations

Are there certain vaccination requirements at UVic?

Students are not required to provide vaccination records to register or start classes at UVic.

Before you arrive:

- Learn about immunization recommendations in BC
- Compile your vaccination records
- Consult a health practitioner if you have questions about getting vaccinated

When in Canada:

- Learn about and take measures to prevent the spread of any contagious virus, e.g. measles
- See a health practitioner or pharmacist if you have questions about immunization
- If you're worried about transmission, call 811 to get free medical guidance from a nurse



Students with Dependents

All members of your family should have health insurance while they are residing in Canada.

Health insurance:

- Apply for <u>BC MSP</u> as a family
- Option to enroll you family members in <u>GuardMe</u> and <u>extended health benefits</u>

Your Immigration Documents


While you study at UVic

- Study permit (status document)
- Temporary resident visa (TRV) or Electronic travel authorization (ETA) (entry document)
- Co-op work permit (if applicable)

After graduation

Post-graduation work permit (PGWP)





Immigration Documents for Accompanying Family Members

Spouse/common law partner

- Spousal Open Work Permit (SOWP) or Visitor Visa
 - SOWP is only available to spouses/partners of students in select programs such as master's, PhD and certain professional degree programs at the undergraduate level.
- eTA or TRV

Dependent children

- Study permit or Visitor Visa
- eTA or TRV

Travelling to Canada

- Valid passport or other accepted travel document
- Valid temporary resident visa or eTA (if required)
- Valid Letter of Acceptance from UVic
- Letter of introduction/port of entry letter or valid study permit
- UVic Verification of Enrolment (Online tools)
- Proof of funds
- Proof of a valid <u>immigration medical examination</u> (if required)



Bring this letter of introduction with you to Canada. It has information that may be used by the Canada Border Services Agency to issue your study permit.



Canada is made after an administron by an officer in Canada. At that time, an officer will assess if you still need the redurements of the *Immigration and Refugee Protection Act*, its Regulations (in any) other Canadian legislation.



Documents you must bring with you to get your study permit:

- · a valid passport or travel document.
- Your study permit won't be valid beyond your passport's expiry date.
- · a valid temporary resident (visitor) visa (TRV) or Electronic Travel Authorization (eTA), if required.
 - o Your eTA is valid for multiple visits to Canada, until and is linked to the passport you used when you applied to study in Canada. If you obtain a new passport before you will need to apply for a new eTA by visiting www.canada.ca/eTA.

Letter of Introduction / Port of Entry Letter

- Be sure to review all conditions carefully
- Review information and arrival deadline
- Follow the instructions to prepare your arrival
- Consult with us if you have question

Study Permit

Be sure to:

- Review all conditions (including work conditions and institution name) carefully
- If there is an error, kindly request corrections before leaving the port of entry (POE)
- Consult with an Immigration Specialist if needed
- Plan to extend your document 6-8 months before it expires

Study Permit Conditions

As a study permit holder, you must:

- Be enrolled at the designated learning institution (DLI) named on your study permit, unless you're exempt
- Apply for a new study permit to change post-secondary schools
- End your studies if you no longer meet the requirements of being a student, and
- Leave Canada when your permit expires
- Show you're actively pursuing your studies, unless you're exempt, by
 - Being enrolled full-time or part-time during each academic semester (excluding scheduled breaks)
 - Making progress towards completing your program's courses, and
 - Not taking an authorized leaves longer than 150 days from your study program

Changing Designated Learning Institutions (DLIs)

As of November 8, 2024, you must be enrolled at the DLI named on your study permit.

If you applied for your current study permit with a Letter of Acceptance from another institution and did not submit a DLI change to IRCC before November 8, you will need to apply for a new study permit to attend UVic.

As part of the application, you must include a letter explaining why you're changing schools. You should submit this application as soon as possible.

- If you do not receive your new study permit in time to start studies in January, you will need to change your entry point. Contact your Admission Officer (UG) or graduate secretary (GR) to discuss your options.
- If you are currently holding a study permit to attend secondary school in Canada, you need to get a new study
 permit by <u>applying to extend</u> your current one to attend a post-secondary school. You can continue your
 studies at the post-secondary level while waiting for a decision on your new study permit application. If your
 study permit application is refused, you must stop studying immediately.



If you are registered with <u>Centre for Accessible</u> <u>Learning</u> (CAL), consult with your CAL adviser Adviser for your full-time definition.



Full-Time Definition for Undergraduate Students


- Minimum 6 units in a 4-month term
- Minimum 12 units in fall term and spring term combined (Winter Session)
- Enrolment in a full-time Co-op term



Summer sessions are considered scheduled breaks for many (but not all) UG programs. Consult with your Academic Adviser if not sure.

Full-Time Definition for Graduate Students

- Continuous enrolment required
- Minimum 3 units in a single term
- Enrolment in a Co-op term



Study Permit Work Authorization

- Have a valid study permit with on/off campus remarks
- Have a Social Insurance Number (SIN)
- Be registered in full-time studies at UVic during regular academic sessions except for final term
- Have started your program

Co-op Work Permit

- If your program at UVic includes a work component such as co-op, internship, or practicum, even if it is unpaid, you will need a co-op work permit
- The co-op work permit can only be used for work that is an integral component of your studies at UVic
- To apply for a co-op work permit, you will need a letter from your UVic Co-op, internship, or practicum program confirming that work is required for your program

Immigration Medical Exam (IME)

An immigration medical exam is required to work in certain jobs or settings in Canada. This applies even if the work is unpaid, and regardless of the type of work authorization you are using (on campus, off campus, co-op/internship/practicum work permit, post-graduate work permit, etc.)

A few examples of jobs/settings for which you will require a medical exam include:

- Workers in health-care settings
- Workers in primary or secondary school settings
- Workers in childcare settings

Social Insurance Number (SIN)

What is a SIN? How do I apply?

- Used for tax purposes, and required in order to be paid for work that you do in Canada
- Register for the SIN Application Drop-in on January 6, 2026

- Study permit processing timelines and options
- Online studies and post-graduation work permit (PGWP)

Deadlines:

- Lasts day for 100% reduction of second term fees January 18, 2026
- Last day for adding courses in the second term (except for Faculty of Law) January 21, 2026
- Last day for 50% reduction of tuition fees February 8, 2026

Immigration Tips

- Be patient
- Answer questions honestly, consistently and briefly
- Review your study permit at the border
