MSRI Sahabat School is an informal learning center that provides education and support to over 500 refugee youth aged 5 to 17 from more than 13 different nationalities. Students attend classes five days a week for three hours daily, focusing on core subjects: English, Math, Science, and Social Studies.

But Sahabat School is more than just a place for learning—it's a sanctuary. For children who have faced displacement and uncertainty, the school offers a safe and welcoming space where they can find stability and belonging. Within its walls, students are surrounded by a diverse community that encourages friendship, creativity, and play. Here, students are given the tools to succeed academically and supported emotionally and socially. The school nurtures resilience, confidence, and hope, empowering children to heal, grow, and thrive as they await resettlement and the chance to build brighter futures.






