The Canadian Institute for Substance Use Research (CISUR) conducted an environmental scan in 2023 to identify groups and organizations in Canadian provinces and territories who involve people with lived and living experience (PWLLE) in their work.

Groups and organizations included in this resource:

- have information publicly available;
- are located and operating within a Canadian Province, Territory, On-reserve, or on unceded territories
- involve PWLLE in some significant way, ranging from general membership to leadership; and
- may be interested in alcohol policy and/or work with people who use alcohol and other drugs.

The list was compiled using publicly available information found through an online search. It includes groups and organizations who do not directly focus their work on alcohol but whose clients/service users may use alcohol in addition to other substances.
