Creating Contact, Bridging Divides

Canada has seen a concerning rise in antisemitic hate crimes and incidents in the 21st century. Those who seek to curb the rise of anti-Jewish hate typically address the problem through legal and political means. I argue that we need strategies, programs, and initiatives that target the social roots of antisemitism. In this presentation, I examine social and community-based strategies that focus on intergroup contact and bridging divides between Jewish and non-Jewish communities. These programs proactively seek to improve social relations with Jewish communities as a form of lasting and meaningful change.
