


## The Shape of the World: Knowledge Visualization in the Medieval Ages

The use of advanced computer graphic capability to represent facts and relationships in visual form—what we call knowledge visualization—has now become a major field of scholarly activity. But the use of complex imagery to transfer knowledge dates back hundreds of years and is global in scope. I examine the use of such imagery in medieval Europe, where the practice was especially well-developed, and spanned the entire range of intellectual, technical, and practical activity.
