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Artful Dealings: The Noble Vision of René d'Anjou

Early Renaissance Europe was exhausted by war, and, around the Mediterranean, the Ottoman Turks were a threat that none of the Christian powers were ready to face. In this unsettled world, René d'Anjou (1409–80) ruled over a sprawling state that included parts of modern-day France and Italy. Speaking to his time, King René's artistic production presents a renewed vision of nobility inclusive of Islam. Portraying himself and Sultan Mehmed II as two legitimate noble knights, René hints at a new sociopolitical model for how to relate across difference.
