Much of the art produced in Trecento Italy was commissioned by well-to-do merchants and was of fundamental importance in letting its viewers know that the merchant was an ethical man who understood his Christian obligations around money, and was thus worthy of salvation. In this lecture we will explore the underlying motivations of these merchants and how they expected such imagery to achieve this function, using a new analytical model called The Merchant's Moral Eye.
