A palliative approach takes principles of palliative care and

ADOPTS them EARLY in the course of a person's life-limiting condition

**ADAPTS** strategies to meet patient and family needs

EMBEDS practices into usual care in settings that do not specialize in palliative care

## Better recognition of chronic conditions as they progress towards death is needed

When asked to identify the proportion of people in care settings with a chronic life-limiting illness...

Has life-limiting condition 5

Home & community care Average proportion of clients identified

Does not have life-limiting condition

Lower than expected.

#### Long term care

(out of 10)

Average proportion of residents identified (out of 10)

Lower than expected. Most residents have progressive life-limiting conditions when they move into care.



Acute medical units

Average proportion of patients identified (out of 10)

Lower than expected. Also, a palliative approach was only used with half of the patients identified.



Percentage of nurses and home care workers who see their knowledge as less than adequate in noted areas below:



#### Learning builds skills and confidence - Interactional learning is preferred:

Face-to-face learning draws on the expertise of colleagues, including "just in time" learning from huddles, care rounds, and mentorship



Online supported learning and self-study are used, but not preferred
