COURSE OUTLINE Honours Thesis I/II

PREREQUISITES: Open only to students enrolled in EOS Honours programs. EOS 499A is the prerequisite for EOS 499B.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

499A: The first stage of a research project conducted under the direction of a faculty member.

499B: Continuation of a research project conducted under the direction of a faculty member.

The Honours thesis provides students an opportunity to conduct an independent research project under the direction of a faculty member, normally during their final year of study. A student should discuss potential research projects with faculty members (regular and/or adjunct) and decide on a project by the beginning of their final year at the latest. The Honours Thesis requires two terms to complete.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Development of analytical, organizational, and communication skills.

Development of the ability to work efficiently both individually and as part of a research group.

Creation of an effective research proposal, with clear articulation of motivation, background, methods, anticipated results, and timeline.

Production of a clearly written, original and thoroughly researched thesis that analyzes or addresses a significant research question.

Delivery of an oral presentation on the research project that is well structured, effectively delivered, and appropriate for a multi-disciplinary audience.

Course materials are project-specific, to be discussed with the thesis supervisor(s).

EVALUATION

Ungraded: Thesis Proposal (due Oct 1 2024)

Ungraded: Poster presentation at Honours Fest (late Feb 2025 - exact date TBC)

10%: Oral presentation (Mar 18 2025)

90%: Honours thesis (due Apr 4 2025)

Evaluation for EOS 499A/B is based upon a written thesis marked by the supervisor and on a public oral presentation. A committee convened by the Honours Advisor determines the oral presentation grade, with criteria including the quality of both the research and the presentation. A grade of INP is assigned to 499A until 499B is completed, at which point both 499A and 499B receive the same grade. Graduation with Honours requires a certain grade in EOS 499 as well as other course/GPA requirements (depends on program – see UVic Calendar). A grade or GPA below this results in EOS 499 being changed to EOS 490 (Directed Studies) on the student's transcript, and graduation with a Major instead of Honours.

COURSE POLICIES

REGISTRATION AND GRADING LOGISTICS

Register for EOS 499A in the first term and EOS 499B in the second term of your Honours thesis. Both courses require permission to be set by the department for registration. You may do your Honours thesis in any combination of terms (i.e., Fall/Spring, Spring/Fall, Spring/Summer, Summer/Fall, etc..) as agreed with your supervisor. Initially you will receive an INP grade for EOS 499A, which will be changed to your final grade when 499B is completed – you receive the same grade for both 499A and 499B. If you do not complete 499B, the INP grade for 499A will be changed to N.

THESIS TOPIC

The point of the Honours thesis is to introduce students to the process of conducting independent scientific research. Literature searches do not constitute material for Honours theses unless a significant amount of material from the existing literature is reinterpreted in an original way. Moreover, excessive literature searches and summaries of previous methods/ studies in the thesis are not warranted.

THESIS PROPOSAL

A two-page proposal of the thesis is submitted to the Honours Advisor and to your thesis supervisor(s) at the end of the first month of EOS 499A (Oct 1 for Fall/Spring students). This proposal should summarize the intended project agreed to by the student and supervisor. Points to include are the goals of the project, wider importance, methods to be used in carrying out the project, expectations for the results (if known), and a timeline for the project. The proposal should be sent to the Honours Advisor by email as a pdf file, with filename proposal_surname.pdf.

HONOURS FEST

EOS Honours students registered in EOS 499B in the Spring term are normally expected to produce a poster on their Honours research, and to present at the Faculty of Science Honours Fest, generally scheduled in late February.

Participation in Honours Fest provides students with experience in presenting their research to a wide audience, similar to presenting at a scientific conference, as well as providing a useful deadline for the synthesis and initial interpretation of project results.

HONOURS ORAL PRESENTATION

All EOS 499B students must give a 15-minute public presentation describing their research and conclusions in: a departmental seminar series scheduled in the last three weeks of the Spring term, or a special seminar in the last three weeks of the Summer or Fall terms (intended for students not completing EOS 499B at the end of the Spring term). Presentation guidelines will be provided to students at the start of the 499B term.

HONOURS THESIS

The Honours thesis normally consists of a Title Page, Abstract, List of Tables, List of Figures, Introduction, Background, Methods, Results, Discussion, Conclusions, and Bibliography (or References Cited). Typical Honours theses are approximately 50 to 70 pages, but the expected length should be discussed with your thesis supervisor(s).

The Honours thesis is due to the Honours advisor, and to your thesis supervisor(s) for grading, on the last day of classes in the second term.

An electronic copy of the thesis for the SEOS archives should also be provided to the SEOS Honours advisor. Binding of hard copies of the thesis at the expense of the student or the supervisor can be organized by SEOS, if desired. In this case, submit the number of hard copies desired for binding to the SEOS office unbound, with no holes, in a folder. Students can view examples of B.Sc. theses from 2012 and earlier in the main SEOS office for further details of format, etc.

ROLE OF THESIS SUPERVISOR

The supervisor should oversee the research, and should be a regular SEOS faculty member or an adjunct faculty member. Periodic meetings with the student should occur to check and guide progress. In the event that an adjunct professor or outside expert is supervising a thesis, a regular SEOS faculty member must act as a co-supervisor to help with these duties. The supervisor(s) assigns a grade to the written thesis.

In the case of an outside main supervisor, the role of a SEOS co-supervisor may vary. At a minimum, they should ensure that the Honours project has clear objectives, is of appropriate scope, and that the student has sufficient support to achieve the objectives. The co-supervisor should periodically attend meetings with the student and main supervisor, to help keep the student's progress on track.

ROLE OF HONOURS ADVISOR

The Honours Advisor admits eligible students to the Honours Program, and confirms that rules and regulations for thesis material, content, and submission are being met. This person also schedules the Honours presentations, assigns a grade to the presentation (in consultation with a committee), and submits final grades.

POLICY: LATE THESIS

Your supervisor (if co-supervised, the SEOS faculty member) may grant an extension to the due date of your Honours thesis for legitimate reasons. Potential reasons include delays in obtaining research results that are out of the student's control such as problems with method development, obtaining samples or instrument time, etc... or significant illness. Inform the Honours Advisor when an extension is granted. Honours theses submitted late (without an extension) will normally be penalized 5% per day.

POLICY: ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

It is every student's responsibility to be aware of the university's policies on academic integrity, including policies on

cheating, plagiarism, unauthorized use of an editor, multiple submission, and aiding others to cheat.
