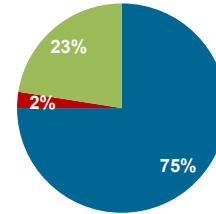

Reading This Worksheet

This worksheet has been created as a program planning tool for recently admitted, undeclared students. **If you are a current declared student, you must refer to your CAPP report (Degree Evaluation) for the most accurate summary of your remaining program requirements.**

Although this worksheet has been designed according to full-time four-year timeline, students are **not** required to organize their degree according to this timeline and may elect to complete their degree in more than four years, as a part time student, or by taking courses in the Summer Sessions. Refer to [Undergraduate Academic Regulations](#) within the Academic Calendar for more detailed information.

For requirements that offer a selection of courses, there is not always room on the worksheet to include all options. Where a course range is not explicitly listed, or includes an ellipsis ("..."), you should refer to the program requirements for your program in the [Academic Calendar](#) for a complete list of options.

You can find a list of the courses you have already taken at UVic, a list of courses for which you have received transfer credit (if applicable), and a list of the courses you are currently registered in by reviewing your Administrative Transcript on your [My Page](#).

Pre- and Corequisites

Course prerequisites are listed in Course Descriptions within the [Academic Calendar](#) and must be satisfied before beginning any given course.

"Corequisites" can refer either to Course Corequisites or Program Corequisites. Any listed Course Corequisites must be completed before or at the same time as a given course. Program Corequisites (indicated on this worksheet as **red courses**) refers to required courses offered by schools or departments outside of a student's major school or department.

Make sure to review the individual course and program requirements carefully before registering in order to sequence your program correctly.

Choosing Electives

Electives (indicated in **Green**) can be chosen from any area of study and taken in any year, as long as you meet the prerequisites. Use these courses to explore different areas of study or include a minor or second major.

Declaring Your Program

After successfully completing 12.0 units of coursework (including transfer credit), you are eligible to declare your program. To do so, complete the online Request to Declare Program form through your My Page account by visiting www.uvic.ca/declareme. Transfer students with 12.0 units or more of transfer credit may submit a program declaration form only after they have begun their coursework at UVic. Once your request has been approved, you'll be given access to an online "Curriculum, Advising and Program Planning" (CAPP) report, or "Degree Evaluation", that allows you to track your progress towards degree completion. Your CAPP report is the official record used by the Office of the Registrar to determine your eligibility for graduation.

UVic Residency Requirement: In order to graduate, students must complete at least 30.0 of their minimum 60.0 required units at UVic. Within these 60.0 units, 21.0 units must be upper-level (300/400-level) courses, and 18.0 of those 21.0 units must be taken at UVic.

Footnotes

1. Students may complete Concentrations within the BA Major program in the following areas: Coastal Studies; Environment and Sustainability; Geomatics; and Urban, Health, and Development Studies. Each Concentration includes at least one second-year Geography course. For a complete list of courses required for each Concentration, refer to the [Department of Geography Program Requirements Page](#) within the Academic Calendar.
2. You may take ES 200 and/or ES 240 in Year One and replace them with Electives (any level) in Year Two.
3. Students can substitute GEOG 226 with one of STAT 255 or STAT 260. Students who already have credit for an introductory statistics course numbered 200 or above from another academic unit must consult with a Geography Undergraduate Adviser before registering in GEOG 226 (see [Credit Limit – Beginning Level Statistics Courses](#)).
4. GEOG 308 is excluded from being counted toward GEOG 300- or 400-level requirements in Geography programs.
5. SOSC 300 can be substituted for 1.5 units of upper-level Geography.
6. Students may select up to 3.0 units of upper-level (300/400-level) courses from other departments and schools; however, upper-level (300/400-level) courses used towards your Environmental Studies Major cannot also be counted towards the upper-level requirements for your Geography Major. Refer to the [School of Environmental Studies Program Requirement Page](#) within the Academic Calendar for a complete list of applicable courses.
7. Advanced topics courses, ES field courses, courses from other units on campus, or courses from other institutions may also be used to meet this requirement subject to approval by the School of Environmental Studies undergraduate adviser. Refer to the [School of Environmental Studies Program Requirement Page](#) within the Academic Calendar for a complete list of applicable courses.

Student Responsibility

You are responsible for the completeness and accuracy of your registration and for determining the requirements of your program.

Always read course descriptions before you register to determine if you have the necessary prerequisites, and pay attention to notes on mutually-exclusive and cross-listed courses (pairs of courses in which credit will be awarded for only one).
