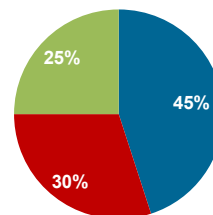

Reading This Worksheet

This worksheet has been created as a program planning tool for recently admitted, undeclared students. **If you are a current declared student, you must refer to your CAPP report (Degree Evaluation) for the most accurate summary of your remaining program requirements.**

Although this worksheet has been designed according to full-time four-year timeline, students are **not** required to organize their degree according to this timeline and may elect to complete their degree in more than four years, as a part time student, or by taking courses in the Summer Sessions. Refer to [Undergraduate Academic Regulations](#) within the Academic Calendar for more detailed information.

For requirements that offer a selection of courses, there is not always room on the worksheet to include all options. Where a course range is not explicitly listed, or includes an ellipsis ("..."), you should refer to the program requirements for your program in the [Academic Calendar](#) for a complete list of options.

You can find a list of the courses you have already taken at UVic, a list of courses for which you have received transfer credit (if applicable), and a list of the courses you are currently registered in by reviewing your Administrative Transcript on your [My Page](#).

Pre- and Corequisites

Course prerequisites are listed in Course Descriptions within the [Academic Calendar](#) and must be satisfied before beginning any given course.

"Corequisites" can refer either to Course Corequisites or Program Corequisites. Any listed Course Corequisites must be completed before or at the same time as a given course. Program Corequisites (indicated on this worksheet as **red courses**) refers to required courses offered by schools or departments outside of a student's major school or department.

Make sure to review the individual course and program requirements carefully before registering in order to sequence your program correctly.

Choosing Electives

Electives (indicated in **Green**) can be chosen from any area of study and taken in any year, as long as you meet the prerequisites. Use these courses to explore different areas of study or include a minor or second major.

Declaring Your Program

After successfully completing 12.0 units of coursework (including transfer credit), you are eligible to declare your program. To do so, complete the online Request to Declare Program form through your My Page account by visiting www.uvic.ca/declareme. Transfer students with 12.0 units or more of transfer credit may submit a program declaration form only after they have begun their coursework at UVic. Once your request has been approved, you'll be given access to an online "Curriculum, Advising and Program Planning" (CAPP) report, or "Degree Evaluation", that allows you to track your progress towards degree completion. Your CAPP report is the official record used by the Office of the Registrar to determine your eligibility for graduation.

UVic Residency Requirement: In order to graduate, students must complete at least 30.0 of their minimum 60.0 required units at UVic. Within these 60.0 units, 21.0 units must be upper-level (300/400-level) courses, and 18.0 of those 21.0 units must be taken at UVic

Footnotes

1. It is important to complete the required Psychology courses in the appropriate year, and to complete ENGL 135 early in your program. Corequisites and electives can be spread out over the four years depending on when they are offered and how they fit into your timetable.
2. ENGL 135 is required regardless of having already satisfied the [Academic Writing Requirement \(AWR\)](#) from Secondary School. If you have **not** yet satisfied the AWR, ENGL 135 will satisfy it. If you already have credit for a course that satisfies the AWR (other than ACWR transfer credit), please contact your Academic Adviser.
3. Although PHIL 100 *can* be used to satisfy the Philosophy requirement, PHIL 100 is a year-long course worth 3 units. Since you are only required to complete 1.5 units of Philosophy, PHIL 100 would satisfy both your Philosophy requirement and consume 1.5 units of Electives on your worksheet. If you are unsure of which course to select, contact the Psychology Unit Adviser or your Academic Adviser for recommendations.
4. Social Science courses can be selected from Anthropology (ANTH), Economics (ECON), Environmental Studies (ES), Geography (GEOG), Political Science (POLI), and Sociology (SOCL), but **not** Psychology (PSYC). SOSC courses will **not** satisfy this requirement unless permission is granted from the Psychology Unit Adviser.
5. Science courses can be selected from Astronomy (ASTR), Biochemistry (BIOC), Biology (BIOL), Chemistry (CHEM), Earth and Ocean Sciences (EOS), Mathematics (MATH), Microbiology (MICR), Physics (PHYS) and Statistics (STAT). Additional Computer Science (CSC) courses and EPHE 141, 241, and 242 may also be counted towards the Science course requirement.
6. Students must complete two courses (3.0 units) in two of the four content streams (**Mind and Brain; Social Psychology; Lifespan Development; Mental Health and Wellbeing**), plus one course (1.5 units) in a third content stream (total: 5 courses = 7.5 units). Refer to the [Academic Calendar](#) for a complete list of stream courses.
7. **Excluding** PSYC 400A, 405, 490, 492, 499.

You are responsible for the completeness and accuracy of your registration and for determining the requirements of your program.

Always read course descriptions before you register to determine if you have the necessary prerequisites, and pay attention to notes on mutually-exclusive and cross-listed courses (pairs of courses in which credit will be awarded for only one).
