Evolution and Ecology



This research theme connects the traditional subfields of archaeology and biological anthropology to address questions of how humans and non-human primates relate to their environments over both short and longterm time scales. Space, Place, Knowledge and Power



This research theme works across anthropological and archaeological approaches to see the significance of social spaces, meaningful places and the situated nature of knowledge, through ideas of belonging, cultural landscapes, displacement, borders, land tenure, and built environments—in shaping human life.

TIME TO COMPLETION

MA

- 2 years
 - 1st year coursework
 - 2nd year research & thesis



PhD

- 4 years
 - 2 year residency: coursework
 - $3^{rd} 4^{th}$ year: research & dissertation



FAQ

- Can I apply before I complete my previous degree?
 - Yes you just need to complete your previous degree before September
- How is admission determined?
 - Admissions decisions are based on a variety of factors:
 - ✓ the applicant's scholarly promise as evidenced by transcripts
 - ✓ statement of interest, letters of recommendation and written work
 - \checkmark availability of faculty to supervise the applicant's research
 - number of students currently enrolled in the program
- How many students usually apply and how many are accepted?
 - We receive between 30-50 applications per year
 - We accept between 10-15 applicants per year
- How many grad students are currently in the program?
 - 38 (18 MA & 20 PhD)





STUDENTS' QUESTIONS AT THE SESSION

How does a 1-year MA program compare to UVic's program?

- These programs tend to be be course-based with no research component, so may not prepare you for a PhD
- They may prepare you for job = good option if you don't wish to go on to do PhD
- Best to contact the department offering those programs and ask them directly

What do you think of completing all your degrees at the same university?

- Understandable especially in today's world (given the high cost of living/moving)
- Advise against three degrees (undergraduate, MA & PhD) from one school, but two are probably OK

Can you take a year off between undergraduate and graduate school?

• Yes –stay in touch with your potential supervisor and/or faculty who you want to write reference letters so they remember you. Also apply for the CGS-M and CGS-D (SSHRC or NSERC funding) in the fall before you start.
