

## Retirement: Dr. Lisa Gould

Dr. Lisa Gould completed her BA (1986) and MA (1989) in Anthropology from University of Alberta, and her PhD (1994) in Biological Anthropology from Washington University. She was a Killam Post-Doctoral Fellow between 1994 and 1996. Following a couple years teaching in Alberta and BC, she came to UVic as a Visiting Assistant Professor in 1998-99. The next year, she joined the department as an Assistant Professor, eventually becoming a Full Professor in 2011.

Dr. Gould's research has focused on the ecology and behaviour of ring-tailed lemurs (*Lemur catta*) of Madagascar, particularly on the socioecology, behavioral endocrinology, demography and conservation of this endangered primate species.

She has held funding from a number of sources, including the National Science Foundation, National Geographic, Wenner-Gren Foundation, NSERC, and Conservation International. Her 32+ peer-reviewed journal articles have appeared in a variety of venues, including but not limited to *American Journal of Physical Anthropology*, *American Journal of Primatology*, *Evolutionary Anthropology*, *Folia Primatologica*, *International Journal of Primatology*, *Primate Conservation*, and *Primates*. In addition, Dr. Gould has written 12 book chapters, a 2006 volume written with ML Sauther titled *Lemur: Ecology and Adaptation*, and too many conference presentations and invited lectures to count. Since 2015 has served as an Associate Editor for the *American Journal of Physical Anthropology*.

Dr. Gould has been the primary supervisor for 9 Masters students (both MA and MSc), and 4 doctoral students at UVic. Included among her many service roles for the University, Dr. Gould was twice our department's graduate advisor, and in her most recent spell in this role (2008 and 2012) she played an integral role in developing and securing approval of our PhD program. Among her many media contributions, Dr. Gould was a Scientific Advisor for the BBC series *Madagascar*, with Sir David Attenborough – which I think is probably every biologist's dream!

Dr. Lisa Gould retires on December 31, 2018 from the Anthropology Department, University of Victoria.
