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Developing countries are characterized by low income, inadequate development of markets and low human capital attainment. In these countries, a large proportion of economic activities take place outside the formal sector (the informal economy). A significant section of individuals and households lack access to financial markets. This course will focus on analyzing and understanding the development process and the major factors hindering it. In particular, it will examine the role of human capital, urbanization, migration, informal sector and financial markets in the development process. A major focus will be on understanding the effects of government policies both micro and macro on the development process. As it is an advanced undergraduate course, students will be introduced to formal theoretical models both micro and macro and empirical methods used to analyze these issues. Students are expected to be comfortable with basic calculus (derivatives and constrained and unconstrained optimization) and statistical and econometric methods.

Learning Outcomes

Students will learn to:

- Characterize development process using cross-country time-series data (Penn World Table).
- Use regression methods to test the convergence process and implications of growth models (growth regressions).
- Use formal growth models to analyze the development process.
- Analyze the interaction among human capital, urbanization, migration, informal sector and development.
- Analyze the effects of public policies on the development process.
- Understand the causes and consequences of imperfections in financial markets.

Recommended Textbooks and Other Material:

Introduction to Economic Growth, C. I. Jones and D. Vollrath, Norton. This is a standard under-graduate text-book for economic growth. The 4th edition (2024) is the latest edition of the book, but you can use the 3rd edition as well. I will refer to this book below as J & V.

Development Economics: Theory and Practice, A. De Janvry and E. Sadoulet, 2nd Edition, 2021. An excellent treatment of development issues for advanced under-graduate students. I will refer to this book below as J & S.

Grading:

Grading will be based on a take-home assignment, three in-class exercises, a mid-term examination and a final examination. Weights: Take-Home Assignment – 15%, In-Class-Exercises – 25%, Mid-Term Examination – 20%, Final Examination – 40%.

Mid-Term Examination: Duration: 50 Minutes, 14:30-15:20, Wednesday, July 30th, in class. Regular class will take place following 10 minute break after the examination.

Final Examination: Duration: 1 Hour and 30 Minutes, Wednesday, August 20th (Last day of class), 14:30-16:00, in class.

Take-Home Assignment: Due Date: Friday, 1st August. To be submitted in class as a hard copy. Email submissions will not be accepted. I will post this assignment on **Brightspace** at least two weeks before the due date. The take-home assignment must be **properly stapled and typed**. Late submissions will not be marked.

In-Class Exercises: In-class exercises must be done in class on the due dates given below. Students will get 30 minutes to complete these exercises towards the end of class. These exercises will be set such that they can normally be done within 20 minutes, so that every student has sufficient time to answer them. I will post a set of questions on the **Brightspace** one week in advance on which in-class exercises will be based. This will allow students ample time to prepare for these questions. Students will be asked to answer a sub-set of these questions in class. Grades for in-class exercises will be based on the **best 2 out 3**.
