COURSE DESCRIPTION

Welcome to GEOG 340 — Cities and Planning! This course will give you a taste of the key components and issues within the planning field in Canada. The emphasis is on real-world examples and practising the skills that planners use every day. While we will explore some theory, I think it's more fun to focus on what is happening in cities and communities today. The readings, lectures, in class discussions, field trips and assignments are meant to help you to get excited about the role of planning in creating a better world. They are also meant to help you see the importance of using critical analysis of current policy and practice, so we can develop an excellent case for strengthening what is going well, while pinpointing what needs to change, and why.

KEY THEMES:

- Planning for healthy, sustainable communities
- Equity and social justice
- Governance and power

REQUIRED TEXT(S)

There is no textbook for this course. Instead, a series of readings and videos (mostly community stories and online reports from governments, non-profit organizations, researchers and consultants) will be used. Class readings will be made available on Brightspace a minimum of 3 weeks prior to each lecture.

To do well in this course, it is essential to complete all assigned readings or videos prior to each class. Without that prior knowledge, it will be difficult for you to fully engage in the discussions each class, and it is through those discussions that you are likely to learn the most.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

After completing this course, you will:

- See urban places and spaces in new ways appreciating that how they got that way is a result of deliberate interventions by a variety of parties over time.
- Understand how housing, transportation, urban design, parks and recreation planning, and other aspects of planning work together to shape each city and the region.
- Have basic knowledge of the different levels of government involved in planning, the tools those governments (and others) use, and the power structures that underlie government decision-making.
- Critically assess urban issues related to planning.
