COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to equip graduate students with essential skills for effective research and professional development. The course covers a variety of topics including structuring and contextualizing a graduate research project, developing effective research communication, and building strategic presentation skills. Students will learn how to propose viable research projects, develop comprehensive work plans, and create impactful professional portfolios. Key activities include a visit from senior graduate students who will share their experiences, as well as workshops on designing meaningful Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) statements, understanding research etiquette and protocols, and utilizing research tools. The course will foster collaborative discussions and provide opportunities to exchange insights and strategies for moving forward in one's academic program. The course will culminate in a student-led conference, allowing students to present their research findings and engage with peers.

KEY THEMES: Research question definition; research proposal writing; research ethics; professional development.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Research Proposal and Planning: Develop a comprehensive research project description and work plan that includes clearly defined objectives, methodologies, and timelines for successful project execution.
- Professional Communication Skills: Demonstrate effective storytelling and presentation skills by preparing and delivering impactful presentations that communicate research findings and engage a broad audience.
- Research Ethics and Protocols: Understand fundamental research ethics and protocols, ensuring
 responsible conduct in research practices, data management, and collaboration within the
 academic community.
