PACTAC: VECTORS SYMPOSIUM SERIES "FELIX GUATTARI'S THE THREE ECOLOGIES" Arthur Kroker and Warren Magnusson Wednesday, November 8, 2:30-4, TEF 170

Led by Warren Magnusson and Arthur Kroker, the Vectors seminar will discuss the extent to which the future of politics, society and affectivity has already been written under the prophetic sign of Felix Guattari's *The Three Ecologies*. A manifesto of radical ecological thought as well as an appeal for political activism in the era of crisis-ridden capitalism, Guattari's *The Three Ecologies* provides a powerful theoretical gateway to the dark future that is now. Arguing that our understanding of ecology must be expanded beyond material nature to include questions concerning the nature of mass affect, specifically rising rates of mental and social deterioration, Guattari proposes an "Ecosophy" that is simultaneously a depth critique of capitalism and an activist agenda for radical transformation.

Warren Magnusson is Professor Emeritus, Department of Political Science, University of Victoria. A political theorist with a particular interest in the urban and the local as sites of politics and government, he is author of *Local Self-Government and the Right to the City, Politics of Urbanism: Seeing Like a City*, and *The Search for Political Space*, among others.

Director of the Pacific Centre for Technology and Culture and Professor of Political Science, University of Victoria, **Arthur Kroker** is a political theorist, focusing particularly on the future of 21st century politics, culture and technology. His writings include *Body Drift*, *Exits to the Posthuman Future* and *Surveillance Never Sleeps*.

CAPI ROUNDTABLE: "CANADA AND SOUTHEAST ASIA: EXPLORING THE CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES"

Southeast Asia is one of the world's fastest growing economies, and for several decades Canada has taken a keen interest. But the region is not without its challenges, which Canadian businesses and diplomatic representatives continue to navigate. This session will examine Canada's current opportunities and challenges in the region, including trade, investment, and human rights. It will discuss key questions, including what are the prospects for a Canada-ASEAN free trade agreement? How do NAFTA discussions affect Canada's relationship with Southeast Asia? What are the opportunities for Canada, and how should Canada respond? Does Canada have the human capacity to engage with Southeast Asia? What are the geopolitical and human rights challenges of engaging with ASEAN? How should Canada balance its engagement with Southeast Asia and its commitment to human rights and social responsibility?

Conference theme: "From Generation to Generation"

Our conference is called Moving Trans History Forward in order to highlight both the history of trans, gender non-binary, and Two-Spirit activists and researchers, and how today's activists and researchers are moving that work forward. We invite trans, gender non-binary, and Two-Spirit activists, community-based and academic scholars, students, family members, service providers, and other allies to submit proposals for presentations, panels, posters, workshops, and creative works for the upcoming Moving Trans History Forward conference (#MTHF18). The conference, March 22nd-25th, 2018, is presented by the Chair in Transgender Studies at the University of Victoria, British Columbia, Canada, which is on the traditional territory of the Songhees, Esquimalt and WSÁNEĆ peoples whose historical relationships with the land continue to this day.

While the theme of the conference is "From Generation to Generation," we welcome proposals concerning any aspect of trans, gender non-binary, and Two-Spirit people and communities. We especially encourage submissions on topics related to the histories and voices of Indigenous, racialized, and disabled trans, gender non-binary, and Two-Spirit people. CAPI CROSSING BORDERS INTERNSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

The Crossing Borders Program, developed by the Centre for Asia Pacific Initiatives (CAPI) is part of the

Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Scholarships (QES) program. CAPI is offering five \$6,000 CAD scholarships per year (from 2015-2018) for Canadian, UVic graduate-level students. Placements include a pre-departure orientation, 3-6 months overseas research project and community engagement activities. The scholarship offers a unique opportunity for graduate students to receive financial and institutional support for the pursuit of research or field-work projects in a Commonwealth country, with preference given to the Asia-Pacific region. Scholars will be expected to identify a partner organization (research institution, university or civil society organization) in a Commonwealth country in advance of their application for the scholarship. Scholars will work closely with their academic advisor and CAPI, engage extensively in our existing research environment (through conferences, presentations, graduate students symposia, and workshops) and contribute to the growing Canada-wide community of QE scholars.
