"ESCAPE FROM DIGNITY: THE HONOUR POLITICS OF JIHAD, SOCIAL MEDIA SHAMING, AND TRUMP" Friday, October 13, 2:30 pm, Fraser 152

Orit Kamir publishes, teaches and is socially active in three interdisciplinary areas: 1. Dignity, respect and honor as moral/ethical values, bedrocks of social structures, and foundations of legislation and policy making; 2. Law-and-Film: analysis of mutual influences of two powerful contemporary discourses, that have substantial impact on the creation and determination of individuals' and societies' forging of their self-perceptions and visions of their identities and futures; 3. Gender politics in societies, cultures and laws. She has authored six monographs and dozens of articles, mostly in these areas, in English and in Hebrew, and has taught in universities in Israel and the United States. She has participated in drafting legislation in Israel, and as founder and academic head of the center for human dignity in Israel she has worked with diverse audiences on implementing dignity and respect in daily life as well as institutional policy making. She earned her BA in law, philosophy and literature at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, and her Masters and Doctorate in Law and Culture at the University of Michigan (under the supervision of the founder of Law and Literature, Prof. J. B. White). She is an active participant in Israel's public discourse and a social activist in gender equality and human rights.

GLOBAL SOUTH COLLOQUIUM

"HAWAIIAN INDIANS AND BLACK KANAKAS: RACIAL TRAJECTOREIS OF NATIVE HAWAIIAN DIASPORIC LABORERS IN THE NINETEENTH CENTURY"

Dr. David A. Chang, Associate Professor of History, University of Minnesota Thursday Oct. 12, 5:30 pm, CLE 109

In the maritime economy of the nineteenth century, Native Hawaiian laborers fanned out across the oceans. Some never returned home, instead settling in spots from Vancouver Island to California to New England to Tahiti. Given that race was (and remains) a structuring difference in settler colonial states and capitalist economies, what were these migrants' experiences of race? How were they categorized by outsiders? What racialized affiliations did they make? This talk will explore the racial trajectories of these Kānaka in multiple sites. In some sites, they entered into what we would now recognize as Indigenous communities. In others, they merged into African-descent populations. In still others, they

entered into the privileged status of whiteness. These differing outcomes provide glimpses into the intersections of racial, class, and national identifications. They also shed light on the early roots of what we might today call a global indigenous identity. David Chang is an historian of indigenous people, colonialism, borders and migration in Hawaii and North America, focusing especially on the histories of Native American and Native Hawaiian people. His book *The World and All the Things Upon It: Native Hawaiian Geographies of Exploration* (University of Minnesota Press, 2016) speaks to a foundational imperative in Indigenous studies: the need to not just understand Indigenous people from their own perspectives, but to understand the world from their perspectives as well.

The Global South Colloquium, a new initiative at the University of Victoria, provides a forum for intellectual exploration of the "Global South," the post-colonial world, and the world-system, its contours, inequities, and sources of power, thereby including a focus not divided by geography and nation-states, but defined by placement within global histories and practices. The theme for 2017-18 is Asian migration and globalization, including lectures by Dr. David Chang, Ms. Gaiutra Bahadur, and Drs. Sunila Kale and Christian Novotzke. "COMMUNITY INFLUENCE CAPACITY: A STUDY OF TWO PERUVIAN COMMUNITIES' RELATIONS WITH MINING COMPANIES"

While much research has focused on how firms manage relations with communities and other stakeholder groups, less attention has been given to the capacities needed by communities to defend their rights and influence firms. Using a grounded theory research design, this research draws on a comparative study of the relations between two neighboring campesino communities in the Peruvian highlands and the mining companies that affect them in order to better understand the capacity of communities to influence firms.
