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Part 1: Overview

Course Description

Content

This course will introduce you to social psychology and provide a broad overview of the field. We will also cover applications of social psychology to real-world issues and situations. Topics include the self, culture, behaviour, attitudes, persuasion, prosocial and antisocial behaviour, attraction, relationships, stereotyping, prejudice, and more.

Learning Outcomes

- Students will be able to:
 - Evaluate and interpret social psychology research methodology, results, and implications.
 - Identify, define, and provide examples of key social psychology theories and concepts.
 - Identify and describe relevant social psychology theories and concepts when presented with depictions or descriptions behaviours, attitudes, and thoughts
 - Identify common biases that inform people's social thinking, feeling, and behavior, and to recognize how those biases can affect social psychological processes.

Class Sessions

- During class time, I will lead a lecture on a particular topic (see the [class schedule](#)).
- There is no content that is required for an assessment that is in the textbook but not the lectures. Still, many students find the textbook to be a valuable resource.
- You or someone who cares about you is paying for you to be in this course. Engaging in class is strongly encouraged. It will help your grade and overall education.
- I will post slides on Brightspace the morning before the corresponding lecture. The slides do not contain all the information you need for your assessments. If you miss class due to illness, emergencies, or other extenuating circumstances, please email me.

Prerequisites

The pre-requisites for this course are PSYC 100A & 100B. These cannot be waived.

Student and Classroom Rights

Grading Policies

- Grades are rounded to the nearest whole number.
- If there is evidence that an assignment is unfair (e.g., test items that most students missed), I will adjust grades to compensate. I will only apply changes that increase your grade.
- If you're wondering what grade you need to get on the final exam, or any other assignment, please download the spreadsheet on Brightspace titled "Final Grade Estimator" and enter the grades you've gotten so far. Then, you can enter hypothetical grades for the remaining assignment(s) and exam(s) to see what your final grade would be. This is just an estimate.

Course Completion & Deferrals

Students who have completed all three exams will be considered to have completed the course. Failure to complete one or more of these elements will result in a grade of "N" regardless of the cumulative percentage of all other elements of the course. N is a failing grade and factors into GPA as a value of 0. In accordance with the University's policy on academic concessions, "A student who completes all course requirements is not eligible for an academic concession." Consequently, students can only request deferrals for the completion of required course components and not for non-essential course components.

Quizzes (Best 5 of 6 = 16%)

Students will complete 6 quizzes during the term. Each quiz will consist of 10 multiple choice or matching questions and will be available on Brightspace. Quizzes will open after class once all relevant content has been covered and will cover the course content since the past quiz. On the due date, at the specified time, the quiz will close and you will no longer have an opportunity to complete the quiz. Your best 5 marks will count towards your final grade.

You may use your textbook, readings, and notes, but you must submit your own work. Once you begin the quiz, you will have 20 minutes to complete it. I recommend reviewing your materials before starting the quiz, as you will not have time to look up the answer to every question. You can reach out to me to request an extension and/or discuss barriers you may face to completing your quizzes on time.

If you are concerned about technical difficulties, I have posted a test quiz on Brightspace. You can take this test quiz to get a sense of what the quizzes are like and test for any potential technical issues. You go through the test quiz as many times as you like; it will not impact your grade. Exams (71%)

There will be three in-class exams that are worth a total of 71% of your final grade. Exams are entirely multiple choice, 45 questions, and not cumulative. Exam 1 is worth 28%, exam 2 is worth 28%, and exam 3 is worth 15% of your final grade. Each exam will cover all material from the textbook, lectures, and other course materials from the period leading up to the exam. Exam 3 is on the last day of class. This course does not have an exam during the final exam period.

While we expect you to do your best to attend exams, life happens. If you miss an exam, please fill out this form to request a reschedule. You must have a legitimate reason to reschedule the exam. I don't require documentation, and mental health is a legitimate reason. But, if you are

rescheduling because you didn't feel like studying, please consider that you may be taking a seat in the exam makeup session from a classmate who genuinely needs it. To protect the integrity of the exams, they will not be returned to students. If you would like to review your responses, please come by my office hour or set up an appointment.

Research Participation or Summary Credits (3%)

You may either participate in psychology studies through the SONA system or complete short journal article reviews. This counts for 3% of your grade. This is not a bonus or optional part of your grade like in some other classes. One SONA credit is 1% and one research summary is 1%. You may complete any combination of SONA credits and summaries that add up to 3%.

Option 1: SONA Research Participation

As experiential learning is valued in the Department of Psychology and is part of this course, you may earn credit in PSYC 231 by participating in Psychology studies conducted by students and faculty in the Department of Psychology. Each 60 minutes of participation will earn 1 SONA participation credit. Researchers will record students' participation and will advise the course instructor of the total SONA credits earned by each student at the end of the term.

For more information, reach out to the Research Participation Coordinator (psycresearch@uvic.ca) or check out the [SONA system website](#). If you choose this option, sign up as soon as possible. If you wait until the end of the term, there may not be many study options available. All Psychology studies have undergone ethics review and have clearance through the Office of Research Ethics.

Option 2: Research Summaries

As an alternative to participation in research, students may submit 1-page summaries of journal articles. Each article review counts as 1% and will be marked on a pass/fail basis. To receive credit, you must follow specific guidelines. The review must:

- Be submitted on Brightspace (not email) by noon on December 4th.
- Be typed using 12-point Times New Roman, double-spaced, and with 1-inch margins.
- Be no longer and not significantly shorter than 1 page.
- Be on articles from the journal *Social Psychological and Personality Science*.
- Fully identify the title, author(s), source and date of the article.
- Include a PDF copy (not a link) of the article submitted along with your review.
- Summarize the hypotheses of the research and the methods used to test the hypotheses. Identify the psychological concepts in the article and indicate the pages in our textbook that discuss the concepts. Critically evaluate the study. Do you agree with their findings? Why or why not? Provide evidence from the text or lecture to support your conclusions.
- Do not copy paste quotes directly from the article.

Participation (6=10%)

On three occasions throughout the term, we will use our class time for group discussion and activities relating to the videos that are assigned watching for our class. You must attend at least 2 of the 3 to get full credit. Each participation assignment is worth 5% of your grade. If you attend all 3, the third will count for extra credit and I will apply 5 bonus points to whichever exam benefits your grade the most.

- Students in Group A (last names starting with letters A - J) will participate on Oct 2, Oct 27, and Nov 27. Students in Group B will use these sessions as study days.
- Students in Group B (names starting with letter K - Z) will participate on Oct 6, Oct 28, and Dec 1. Students in Group A will use these as study days.
- If you are sick or have an unavoidable scheduling conflict, you can come to the other group's participation session. There is no need to email me about this.
- Because one grade is dropped, you have two opportunities to attend for each participation session, and in-class collaboration is essential to the assignment, your participation grades cannot be made up outside of class.

For each participation assignment:

- A guide worksheet and a link to the film/video will be posted on Brightspace. Students should complete the guide worksheet while watching the film/video.
- You can complete the guide digitally or on paper. However, if you would like to use it to support your in-class worksheet, you will need a paper copy.
- In class, students will meet in small groups of 4-5 students to complete another worksheet I will provide in class about the film/video as it relates to course concepts.
- No devices (tablets, laptops, cell phones, etc.) are permitted while completing the worksheet. You may use your textbook, printed slides, your notes, and your guide, but you can only use paper copies. I recommend printing your notes, slides, etc before class.
- Each group will submit a paper copy of their worksheet at the end of the class.
- Students are also responsible for submitting their individual notes, either digitally via Brightspace or on paper in class.
- Your grade will be based on both your group worksheet and individual notes.

Can I reschedule exam 1 or exam 2?

If you have a legitimate reason (physical or mental health, family emergency, etc), fill out [this form](#) to request a reschedule. I don't require documentation, but please know if you take advantage of this because you didn't feel like studying, you may be taking a makeup exam session seat from one of your classmates with a legitimate illness, injury, or emergency.

Can I reschedule exam 3?

Maybe. Your grades are due shortly after the final exam. If you cannot take it within a few days of the exam, you may have to defer the final and make it up later. Fill out [this form](#) to request a reschedule. If the listed date does not work for you, you will have to defer the final. I'm in Group A, can I participate with Group B? I'm in Group B, can I participate with Group A?

Yes. I only assign groups to try to make the classes relatively even. Just come to the other class, you don't need to email me.

“Academic integrity is built on honesty, respect, and fairness. Students, faculty, and staff at UVic are members of an intellectual community. As such, it’s expected that we’ll adhere to ethical values in all our learning, teaching, and research.”

This policy is in place to ensure that students’ work is being evaluated fairly and that students carry out and benefit from the learning activities assigned in each course.

The offences defined by the policy can be summarized briefly as follows:

1. **Plagiarism.** You must make sure that the work you submit is your work and not another person or a Content Generator. There are proper procedures for [citing the works of others](#). The student is responsible for being aware of and using these procedures.
2. **Unauthorized Use of an Editor or Content Generator.** The use of an Editor or Content Generator is prohibited unless the instructor grants explicit written authorization.
3. **Multiple Submission without Prior Permission.** Only under exceptional circumstances may a work submitted to fulfill an academic requirement be used to satisfy another similar requirement. The student is responsible for clarifying this with the instructor(s) involved.
4. **Falsifying Materials Subject to Academic Evaluation.** This includes falsification of data, use of commercially prepared essays, using information from the Internet without proper citation, citing sources from which material is not actually obtained, etc.
5. **Cheating on Work, Tests, and Examinations.** You may not copy the work of others in or out of class; you may not give your work to others for the purpose of copying; you may not use unauthorized material or equipment during examinations or tests; and you may not impersonate or allow yourself to be impersonated by another at an examination. The Department of Psychology has a policy of not making old examinations available for study purposes. Therefore, use of old exams without the express written permission of the instructor constitutes cheating by the user, and abetting of cheating by the person who provided the exam.
6. **Aiding Others.** It is a violation to help others or attempt to help others to engage in any of the conduct described above.

The use of a generative artificial intelligence (AI) is strictly prohibited in any submitted work (unless expressly endorsed by the instructor as part of an assignment).

Instructors can take actions to prevent cheating and plagiarism. This may include the assignment of seating for examinations, asking students to move during examinations, requests to see student identification cards, and other measures as appropriate. Instructors also have available to them a variety of university approved tools and procedures to check for Internet and electronic media-based cheating. In instances of suspected academic integrity violations, instructors will follow prescribed procedures for alleged academic dishonesty. If academic dishonesty is likely, instructors can take steps consistent with the degree of the offence (see the academic integrity section on [policy violations](#)).

Registration Status

Request for [Academic Concessions](#)

- **Request an in-course extension**
If you require more time to complete a course requirement or miss a test or midterm exam, then you will need to complete the “[In-Course Extension Form](#)” and submit it directly to your course instructor. All course requirements must be completed prior to the submission of final grades.
- **What to do if you miss the final exam scheduled during the formal exam period**
Apply at Records Services for a “[Request for Academic Concession](#)”, normally within 10 working days of the date of the exam. Records Services will forward the form to the instructor. If the concession is granted, the instructor will determine how to deal with the situation (for example, a deferred exam). Where a concession is not applied for or where such application is denied, an N grade will be entered on the student’s academic record.
- **What to do if you require additional time to complete course requirements beyond the normal term.**
Apply at Records Services for a “[Request for Academic Concession](#)”, normally within 10 working days of the end of the course. Records Services will forward the form to the instructor. If the concession is granted, the instructor will determine how to deal with the situation. Where a concession is not applied for or where such application is denied, an N grade will be entered on the student’s academic record if the missing work has been deemed required. Note, only required course components may be deferred.
