SUGGESTED TEXT: Introduction to Clinical Psychology by Lee, C.M, & Hunsley, J. (Wiley Press, 4th Ed,, 2018)

PURPOSE: During this class I will address concepts, methods, and professional issues in clinical psychology, as well as the historical development of the profession, the scientist/practitioner model of training and practice, current clinical methods, ethical issues, and controversies of treatment approach. I will focus on competencies of both the practitioner and the client/patient. In addition, discussion will include assumptions/weaknesses as well as strengths of particular approaches to specific disorders, such as the usefulness of Cognitive-Behavioural Therapy for pre- pubescent children.

- **2. Assignments:** There will be **two** written assignments (10% each).
- <u>#1</u>: out of several topics given (see below). The assignment will be a **maximum** of **five** double-spaced pages, single-sided. This takes the format of a formal peer-researched paper using APA#7 guidelines.
- <u>#2:</u> opinion piece on ablest language and community facilities, structures, edifications **OR** a comparison of 4 disciplines in mental health including clinical psychology, counselling, social work, alcohol and drug rehabilitation.

They are due on: January 23, February 10, 24, March 10, 24, 2025 (Choose 2 of the 5 dates).

TOTAL VALUE: 20%

3. Examinations: There will be **three** short answer examinations (20% each for Exam #1,#2, and 15% for Exam #3) covering information presented in the class and in class discussions.

TOTAL VALUE: 55%

4. Project: Choose one of the following options.

OPTION A

Major essay: It will involve preparing a discussion paper (maximum = **ten** double-spaced pages,) in response to a topic approved by the instructor. Approval of the topic by the instructor is needed by January 28, 2022; without this approval the final paper will not be accepted. In addition, your topic request must include 3 peer-reviewed references.

Essay is due: March 20, 2025 (or earlier).

TOTAL VALUE: 15%

OPTION B

Journal: Keep a journal with minimum of 10 1-page double-spaced, double-sided entries is required reflecting your thoughts regarding key concepts in clinical evaluation, assessment as well as controversies. You are welcome to include articles of interest with a commentary – however, **PLEASE DO NOT RELY ON SOCIAL MEDIA, BLOGS, MOVIES, TELEVISION SHOWS (NETFLIX, CRAVE, TEDX TALKS) FOR YOUR IDEAS.**

Journal is due: March 20, 202 (or earlier – once you have completed the 10 entries).

TOTAL VALUE: 15%

You will be choosing ONE of these.

You may also write on a topic of personal interest; APPROVAL IS NEEDED FROM THE INSTRUCTOR.

1. What are the pros and cons of taking a specific approach to a particular disorder within clinical psychology?
2. Discuss three key societal changes you anticipate will influence how clinical psychology is delivered to clients in the upcoming 20 years. Have recent events such as the pandemic, athlete withdrawals at the Olympics, and human rights protests had an impact upon the global understanding of what constitutes good mental health?
3. Discuss the role clinical psychologists should have in the prescription and discussion of medications for clients with mental health problems.
4. Discuss one particular cultural treatment approach that differs significantly from the most common ethnocentric approaches now used in Canada. Please seek topic approval from the instructor beforehand.
5. Choose one of the key approaches to understanding personality and present the benefits of this particular approach regardless of what is presented in mainstream media (present 2 or 3 of the myths usually accepted in mainstream media). (e.g., psychodynamic, behavioural, trauma-informed, humanism etc.)
6. Relate fundamental principles of clinical psychology and how they are used with benefit in the field of health psychology and behavioural medicine.
7. Relate fundamental principles of clinical psychology and how they should be used with benefit in the field of forensic psychology.

Opinion Piece Topics YOUR OPINIONS DO NOT NEED TO BE SUPPORTED BY EXTERNAL, PEER-REVIEWED REFERENCES

You will be choosing ONE of these.

You may also write on a topic of personal interest; APPROVAL IS NEEDED FROM THE INSTRUCTOR.

- 1. Discuss the notion of: ablest language and community facilities, structures, edifications e.g., turn a blind eye, turn a deaf ear, crippled by ...
- 2. Compare and Contrast approaches to understanding mental health: Each student will prepare a short informal paper (i.e., not APA#7 formatting / a table may be useful) that compares and contrasts:

Clinical Psychology, Counselling, Social Work, Alcohol & Drug Counsellor

With regard to:

- a. education requirements, costs and length of time of the education
- b. various institutions offering the training in Canada or around the world (a minimum of 3 for each and the facilities MUST NOT be from the same province, territory, state, etc.)
- c. possible job opportunities and suggested salary/hourly wage
- d. and add a paragraph that addresses ideas regarding concerns in mental health that may not be covered in the disciplines of clinical psychology, counselling, social work and alcohol & drug counselling

Note: Students who have completed the following elements will be

considered to have completed the course:

- element a: at least one midterm (February 3, March 13, 2025)
- element b: the final exam April 3, 2025
- element c: 1/1 major project element
- · element d: at least one mini assignment

POLICY ON MISSED EXAMS:

You are responsible for attending midterms and final exams as scheduled. If you miss a midterm due to an unexpected or unavoidable circumstance (e.g., illness, accident, or family affliction), you must send Dr. Bain as soon as possible indicating that you have missed the midterm, and the reason for it within your comfort level of disclosure. You do not need to provide any formal documentation if the reason is for an unexpected or unavoidable circumstance. If you are missing a midterm due to conflicting responsibility (e.g., representing the university at a academic, artistic, or sporting event; service in the armed forces or emergency services), then documentation is required prior to the exam or midterm. If the reason for missing the exam is deemed acceptable, then a grade for the missing midterm will be generated by proportionally weighting the performance on the other midterm and the final exam.

Failure to contact the instructor will mean a grade of 0 will be assigned to the missing midterm.

No make-up exams will be scheduled. Students who miss both midterms will receive a grade of "N" in the course as they will be deemed to have missed too much of the course material to have met course completion requirements.

Final Exam: If you are unable to attend the final exam you must apply to Records Services for a "Request for Academic Concession" (RAC), typically within 10 working days of the exam date. If an academic concession is granted for the final exam, an alternative date to write the make up exam MUST be arranged with the instructor. **Any student who does not take the final exam will receive an "N"** in this course.

Failure to complete one or more of these elements will result in a grade of "N" regardless of the cumulative percentage of all other elements of the course.

N is a failing grade and factors into GPA as a value of 0. In accordance with the <u>University's policy on academic concessions</u>, "A student who completes all course requirements is not eligible for an academic concession". Consequently, students can only request deferrals for the completion of required course components and not for non-essential course components.

Note: You are responsible for materials in lectures you do not attend. Tests and examinations will contain short-answer questions. Missed examinations with a valid reason will be made up at the earliest convenient time. If you miss an examination due to illness, accident, or family affliction, you must notify Dr. Bain immediately. Missed examinations without a valid reason will receive a score of zero. Number grades will be assigned.

The offences defined by the policy can be summarized briefly as follows:

- 1. **Plagiarism**. You must make sure that the work you submit is your work and not someone else's. There are proper procedures for citing the works of others. The student is responsible for being aware of and using these procedures.
- 2. **Unauthorized Use of an Editor**. The use of an editor is prohibited unless the instructor grants explicit written authorization.
