Crime and Deviance

Course Description:

This course will introduce students to the key theories of crime, deviance and social control. Students will learn about both classical and contemporary theoretical explanations of crime and deviant behaviour and how these theories are reflected in our current criminal justice system. We will cover a wide range of issues and case studies including race and crime, violence against women, crimes against animals, environmental crime, and crime in the media. By the end of the course, students will be able to identify the various theoretical approaches to crime and deviance, as well as critically analyze and evaluate these approaches in relation to contemporary sociological issues and understandings of criminality.

Course Delivery:

The course will be delivered completely online, with a combination of asynchronous and synchronous sessions. Course content will be delivered through recorded lectures and additional, complementary media (TED talks, documentaries, podcasts, etc.), of which students can move through at their own pace each week. Students will however need to be available to attend and participate in the virtual synchronous (live) classes on the following dates:

Students will also engage with their classmates weekly through the use of Packback, an online discussion forum.
