Course Description

Why do many people commit decades of their lives to working in jobs that are precarious, inadequately remunerated, and unsatisfying? What does the future hold for more decent and dignified work? In this course, we will explore the sociology of work and employment, with a focus on the relationship between labour under capitalism and social inequalities. In addition to investigating labour history, we will attend to current labour market trends unfolding in the COVID-19 pandemic including racism, patriarchy, and government responses. This course will give students tools to make more informed decisions about their personal career trajectories and opportunities for collective action.

Format

Course Objectives

The objectives are to: (1) gain a theoretical understanding of labour dynamics under contemporary capitalism; (2) understand how employment has related to specific social inequalities historically and today; (3) evaluate various proposed policy solutions to social problems in the world of work; (4) critically reflect on how course material applies to one's own life and work trajectory.

Course Pre/Co-requisites

SOCI 100A and 100B are pre-requisites. SOCI 215 is recommended.

Topics May Include

COVID-19 and employment; Precarious work; Emotional labour and care work; Feminist, anti-racist, decolonial and anti-capitalist labour movements; Unionization; Work and disability; Animals and humane jobs; Food chain workers.
