

# SOCI 374<sup>1</sup> Qualitative Research Methods

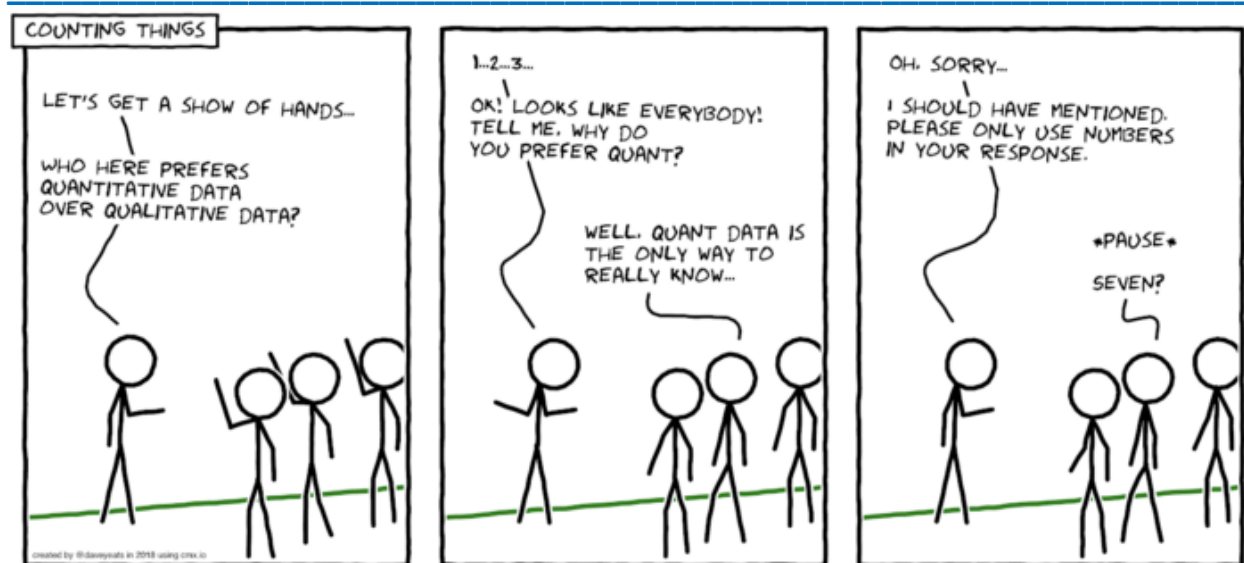


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## Course Description

How do sociologists conduct qualitative research? This course introduces students to several qualitative research methods used in the social sciences. We will also cover core aspects of the research process including design, sampling, data collection and analysis, ethics, reciprocity, and publication for various audiences. Students will carry out their own original research using methods learned in this course, which provides an opportunity to gain hands-on experience. Previous students have published their research in undergraduate journals.

Developing strong skills and practical experience in qualitative methods is useful for a wide range of careers, including academia, market research, government consultation, and non-profits.

The objectives are to: (1) gain an in-depth understanding of selected qualitative methodologies and their key features; (2) understand key aspects of the qualitative research process, including design, sampling, data collection and analysis, ethics, reciprocity, and publication; (3) gain the knowledge-base and practical skills necessary to conduct rigorous, theoretically informed, and ethical research.

Community-based research; Interviewing; Photovoice and art-based methods; Ethnography; Indigenous and decolonizing methodologies.
